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Foreword

We are pleased to present the Angus Community Safety and Antisocial Behaviour Strategy 2009-2012.

Antisocial behaviour has been a focus for Scottish Government in recent years. The previous Antisocial Behaviour Strategy 2005-08 was developed in partnership with Tayside Police in line with the requirements of the Antisocial Behaviour (Scotland) Act 2004. However, both locally and nationally the emphasis has shifted to a focus in prevention and community engagement, as well as enforcements and support. Therefore, community safety in its broadest sense is the overarching framework upon which this strategy is based.

The development of the concordat between the Scottish Government and the Community Planning Partnerships afforded an ideal opportunity to renew our business approach in respect to these two important areas and enable us to link local and national outcomes and objectives.

Although much has been achieved in Angus over the last three years, our fresh approach in delivering community safety and tackling antisocial behaviour now allows us to target our combined resources effectively for the benefit of all our communities.

This combined strategy outlines our collective vision for the next three years to improve the quality of life for all who live, work and visit our communities.

Community safety and antisocial behaviour is the collective priority for a number of organisations. That said, everyone has an important role to play in achieving our outcomes by behaving responsibly, exercising tolerance and reporting crime timeously.

Community Safety and Antisocial Behaviour

Defining the Issues

Community safety has been identified “as the quality of life in which individuals and communities are protected from, equipped to cope with, and have increased capacity to resist crime and antisocial behaviour”.

Under the terms of the Antisocial Behaviour etc. (Scotland) Act 2004, antisocial behaviour is defined as follows:

A person engages in antisocial behaviour if they:-

- act in a manner that causes or is likely to cause harm or distress;
- pursue a course of conduct that causes or is likely to cause alarm or distress to at least one person not of the same household as them.

Antisocial behaviour may include what a person says, and a course of conduct means something done on at least two occasions.

Antisocial behaviour is not new but it is recognised that the actions of a few, threaten the quality of life for the rest of the people in Angus. Instances of vandalism, drunken behaviour, drugs misuse and the playing of loud music have a negative impact on communities, causing unnecessary annoyance and distress. Without direct intervention, minor issues such as litter and dog fouling undermine local communities and may increase the sometimes inaccurate perception that they live in areas of high crime.

As a partnership, we acknowledge the need to provide support to those affected by antisocial behaviour. Without this, confidence in local services is undermined with victims failing to report antisocial behaviour when it occurs, or willing to take a stand against it. Our communities in Angus need to know what can be done, or in some cases what cannot be done, if they are suffering from this issue. It is our



intention to ensure that our citizens know who they should contact for help and they need to feel confident to do this.

In saying that, however, community safety and antisocial behaviour is not just about reducing crime. It encompasses a range of partnership activity that seeks to promote safety and engender the positive sense of security and well-being for our citizens within the home and in their local environment. It is our intention to be intelligence led thus ensuring that we deliver a smarter structured service for our communities.

A list of interventions available under the Antisocial Behaviour etc. (Scotland) Act 2004 is available on Appendix 1.



Aims and objectives

Vision

The Angus Community Safety Partnership has a commitment to making communities in Angus pleasant and secure places to live. This strategy aims to reinforce the views of the partnership on the unacceptability of antisocial behaviour in any form, and outlines how the partnership will actively promote community safety within our communities.

Strategic Aims

The strategy has three strategic aims

- Early Intervention and Prevention
- Enforcement and Support
- Community Engagement

The key delivery actions (appendix 2), as well as the local outcomes, indicators and targets (appendix 3), all reflect these strategic aims.

Key Objectives

The key objectives of the Angus Community Safety and Antisocial Behaviour Strategy are:

- To work with children, families and adults from the earliest possible point
- To promote the responsibility of all community members to respect themselves, their immediate neighbours and the community in general
- To support communities, including the general majority of people who want to live harmoniously with others in a safe and secure environment while confronting the small minority of people whose behaviour undermines this
- To prevent antisocial behaviour arising and escalating through early detection and proactive management.

Single Outcome Agreement

In November 2007, the Scottish Government and COSLA agreed a concordat setting out the terms of a new relationship between the Scottish Government and local government.

The concordat is underpinned by a Single Outcome Agreement between Scottish Government and Community Planning Partnerships. This is based on a set of 15 national outcomes which sets out local outcomes indicators and targets.

The national outcome which is relevant to the Community Safety Partnership is:

- **National Outcome 9:** We live our lives free from crime, disorder and danger

National Framework

In February 2009, the Scottish Government launched its new framework for preventing antisocial behaviour in Scotland called *"Promoting Positive Outcomes: Working Together to Prevent Antisocial Behaviour in Scotland"*.

This framework rests on four pillars - **prevention, integration, engagement and communication**.

Further guidance is due later in the year detailing how national actions and local recommendations will be delivered.

These four pillars of the national framework mirror the three strategic aims outlined in this strategy.



Community Safety - The Angus Picture

There are many pro-active Community Safety projects taking place within Angus and most are supported through the Angus Community Safety Partnership.



Child Safety

Safe Angus

Safe Angus is a safety experiential learning programme which every P6 pupil attends in Angus. Over the course of the day, those taking part are faced with real life scenarios depicting emergency situations. The pupils then assess the dangers and risks presented and learn how to deal with them in a safe setting. Typical scenarios include house fires, water hazards, road safety, railway safety, first aid, smoking, drugs and alcohol, countryside safety, internet safety and other risks at home.

The event is supported by Angus Council, Tayside Police, Tayside Fire and Rescue, NHS Tayside and other community planning partners. Over 1,300 youngsters take part in the twice yearly event.



Home Safety

Home Safety Survey

This is a home safety check for Angus residents over 60 years of age or for those who have a disability carried out by Angus Care & Repair small repairs officers. It is a partnership between Angus Care & Repair and Tayside Fire & Rescue Service.

A room to room check is carried out making recommendations for any changes or improvements which would improve safety in the home. Minor repairs to improve safety are discussed and advice provided regarding access to services to carry out these repairs.

Safe as Houses

Tayside Police, Angus Care and Repair, Tayside Fire and Rescue and Angus Council have formed a partnership to provide a safety and security initiative for the older, disabled and vulnerable people of Angus.

A free crime prevention survey is carried out by the Police Community Liaison Officer and recommendations made as to how the client's safety and security may be improved. The Safe as Houses "pack" contains

- 5 lever mortice lock
- First Aid Kit
- Timer switch
- Crime prevention Pack
- Smoke Alarm



- Door chain
- Low energy light bulb
- Door viewer
- CO detector
- Door intercom

Any of these pack items which are recommended will be fitted by Safe as Houses free of charge. The scheme is available to people who live in Angus who are either over 60 years of age, for those who have a disability or victims of crime or on a low income.



Doorstoppers

Doorstoppers is designed to give reassurance, reduce the fear of crime, as well as reducing incidents of doorstep crime in Angus under the banner of Education, Empowerment, Enforcement – Make Your Doorstep a Barrier Not a Gateway.

The initiative is supported by Tayside Police, Angus Council, Neighbourhood Watch and Help the Aged who are concerned that many incidents go unreported and hope to encourage people to be vigilant and empowered to contact the authorities when they are suspicious of persons at their door or believe they have been a victim of doorstep crime.

Fire Safety

Home Fire Safety Visits

Tayside Fire and Rescue are actively involved in trying to reduce the number of fires and fire deaths. They have a dedicated Community Fire Safety Officer in Angus who is available to give information on the dangers of fire and ways to reduce and prevent fires from occurring. The service now offers free home fire safety visits to everyone in Angus. Referrals to the service are easy and appointments are made to suit residents. During the visit firefighters will check each room to make sure the house is safe. As part of the service, if required, a smoke alarm will be

fitted free of charge

Road Safety

Safe Drive Stay Alive

Safe Drive Stay Alive (SDSA) is a theatre education project which explores the circumstances that can lead to a road traffic collision and the consequences that follow. Statistically, young drivers are much more likely to be involved in a collision, often due to inexperience and a lack of understanding the risks. SDSA aims to reduce the number of casualties amongst young people by questioning their behaviour and attitude on the roads in a hard-hitting way.

Driving Ambition

Driving Ambition is a multi-agency road safety event to raise awareness of safe driving practice and potential consequences of dangerous driving on the road. Aimed at 16 year olds and above, Driving Ambition is presented to S6 pupils at all secondary schools in Angus and first year students at Angus College. It is hoped to take a similar presentation on the RM Condor in Arbroath. Driving Ambition consists of presentations from Tayside Police and Tayside Fire and Rescue and workshops relating to learning to drive, car maintenance, safety camera partnership etc.

Alcohol Awareness

Alcohol and Drugs Partnership

The Angus Alcohol and Drugs Partnership is part of the Angus Community Planning Partnership. The partnership works to reduce the harmful effects of alcohol and drugs misuse on the people of Angus, its economy and environment. This is strongly supported by the members of the Community Safety Partnership who actively involve themselves in the following areas:-

Focus on Alcohol Angus

The Focus on Alcohol Angus project has been actively progressing action to tackle alcohol misuse since October 2006. It seeks to provide action in relation to community safety, health improvement and educational activity.

This project was established to progress the Angus Community Planning Partnerships key priority area to address alcohol use in Angus. This project has been particularly successful in developing a community engagement approach and addressing cross cutting alcohol issues and actions.

To date over 170 actions have been completed.

Antisocial Behaviour Prevention

Local Multi Agency Resource Teams (LMART)

The Local Multi Agency Resource Teams (LMARTs) focus on young people and provide opportunities for partner agencies to meet and discuss children and young people who are experiencing difficulties. Partners include Tayside Police and Angus Council departments of Housing, Education, and Social Work & Health. The LMART is designed to be an early intervention method which provides a co-ordinated approach to supporting young people and preventing future youth offending and antisocial behaviour.

Tayside Fire and Rescue also operate two schemes, "Firesetters" and "Young Firefighters", aimed at young people involved in, or at risk of becoming involved, in antisocial behaviour.

Public Protection and Personal Safety

APODA

The Angus Partnership on Domestic Abuse (APODA) is a Multi-Agency Partnership dedicated

to preventing domestic abuse and coordinating services from voluntary and statutory agencies to ensure support is provided to the families involved.

In addition, the partnership seeks to address wider violence against women issues in Angus such as prostitution and trafficking.

MAPPA (Multi Agency Public Protection Arrangements)

MAPPA is a set of arrangements established by Police, Local Authorities and the prison service in the Angus area (known as the Responsible Authorities) to assess and manage the risk posed by sexual and violent offenders. Other agencies that co-operate in MAPPA include Jobcentre Plus, registered social landlords, strategic health authorities, Care Trusts and NHS Trusts, and electronic monitoring providers.

General

Joint Services Team

The Angus Community Safety Partnership Joint Services Team is a joint team comprising members from Angus Council, Tayside Police and Tayside Fire and Rescue. The team is led by the Service Manager (Community Safety) and the police Community Safety Inspector who have a remit to operationally deliver the Community Safety and Antisocial Behaviour Strategy within Angus.

The Community Safety Strategy is supported through the post of Community Safety Officer (Strategy). This post takes forward the proactive Community Safety side of the business, administering the funding for projects as well as evaluating them. It also leads on the Community Safety Tactical Tasking and Co-ordinating Group, which is a multi-agency group tasked with looking at community safety issues across Angus.

Community Safety Police staff include the Crime Prevention Officer and the Road Safety Officer. There is also a Community Safety Officer from Tayside Fire and Rescue on the team.

Antisocial Behaviour – The Angus Picture

The Anti-Social Behaviour etc. (Scotland) Act 2004 provides a range of measures, some of which are currently in use or have been used in Angus. A composite list of the interventions provided by the Act is attached at Appendix 1.

Following the introduction of the Act, a number of services were introduced in Angus to provide the local response to issues of antisocial behaviour. These include:-



Angus Council Policy and Procedures for Dealing with ASB

Angus Council's approach to dealing with ASB complaints is central to delivering the objectives of the Strategy.

Angus Council's current procedural document on dealing with ASB complaints was required to be reviewed in line with changes in legislation and good practice. It was also required that a separate ASB policy document be added to define and outline Angus Council's aims, attitude and general approach to antisocial behaviour and to communicate clearly what standards of behaviour are acceptable. The new policy document also outlines specific commitments Angus Council is making to the residents of Angus in terms of dealing with ASB and what service standards can be expected. A copy of the ASB Policy document is available at Angus.gov.uk. Current Scottish ASB enforcement measures are detailed at appendix 1.

Joint Services Team

As previously stated, the Joint Services Team in Angus is a joint team comprising members from

Angus Council and Tayside Police. The team is led by the Service Manager (Community Safety), Angus Council and the Community Safety Inspector, Tayside Police.

The Antisocial Behaviour Unit within the Joint Services Team is responsible for managing serious cases of antisocial behaviour. The unit has three investigations officers responsible for investigating and managing complaints about antisocial behaviour. In addition they act as professional witnesses and where necessary provide a service outwith the normal office hours. To support the officers, a solicitor has been employed. The solicitor provides legal advice and support for the team and represents the team in Court matters.

The Antisocial Behaviour Co-ordinator is responsible for the local authorities' operational response to antisocial behaviour issues. The Co-ordinator works closely with local housing offices, housing associations, council departments, the courts and the police to effectively co-ordinate and deal with antisocial behaviour problems experienced by our residents.

The unit is supported by a Community Intelligence Analyst who is trained to identify emerging trends and 'hotspots'. The analyst collects information from a broad range of Partnership members. The team also consists of the Community Safety Sergeant, the Community Safety Liaison Officer, both police officers, and the Youth Justice Assessor.

In a number of areas, early intervention arrangements include regular meetings between local housing staff and the Police to share information and pursue a joint approach to deal with incidents of antisocial behaviour.

ASBOs (Antisocial Behaviour Orders)

From 1st April 1999 Local Authorities have been able to raise an action in the Sheriff Court to address serious antisocial behaviour anywhere in that local authority area.

If the Sheriff accepts the case made by the authority he can grant an ASBO stopping someone from causing serious nuisance and distress to their neighbours. The Police can arrest anyone subject to an Antisocial Behaviour Order who refuses to keep to the conditions imposed by the Order. If this then goes to Court, the Court may decide to fine or imprison them.

ASBOs are mainly used to prevent the most serious types of antisocial behaviour such as assault, racial harassment, repeated incidents of

damage to property, vandalism or unreasonable noise nuisance and other extreme forms of harassment and intimidation.

In Angus, there are currently 34 full ASBOs in force, including CRASBOs (ASBO’s issued by the Sheriff on conviction for another offence) and ASBOs raised by Registered Social Landlords. (information as at June 2009.)

The graph below shows the impact of ASBOs in terms of reduction in complaints of ASB after an ASBO has been granted. In the vast majority of cases, the volume of complaints about ASB being perpetrated by individuals is significantly reduced once an ASBO has been granted.



Closure Orders

Closure orders are currently a police power under the Antisocial Behaviour etc (Scotland) Act 2004. A senior police officer can authorise that a closure notice is served on the premises if they have good reason to believe that a person has been involved in antisocial behaviour on the premises within the last three months. They can also issue a closure notice where the use of the premises is associated with significant, continuous and serious nuisance or disorder.

There have been four closure orders served on premises within Angus to date. On each occasion, these orders have proved effective in providing instant respite for the victims of antisocial behaviour.



Angus Community Mediation Service

Mediation is a way of trying to resolve disagreements that arise between people. Mediation can be used even when a disagreement has been going for a long time or where other agencies such as the police have been involved.

Trained mediators help individuals find their own solutions to problems and take ownership of any agreements made. Mediation can help with any kind of neighbour problem, including:

- antisocial behaviour
- noise
- pets
- rubbish

- parking
- fences
- boundary disputes.

The service is available throughout Angus, whether the client is tenant or home owner. Mediators will visit clients in their homes to discuss the situation.

Short Scottish Secure Tenancy

The Housing (Scotland) Act 2001 introduced the Short Scottish Secure Tenancy (SSST). They can be offered to new tenants under certain circumstances where a member of the household been subject to an ASBO or where a member of the household has had an order for repossession awarded against them following conviction for a criminal offence.

Community Warden Service

The Angus Community Warden Service works closely in liaison with local communities and Tayside Police to target “hotspots” and prevent incidents of antisocial behaviour happening. The main aim of the service is to provide reassurance to communities by providing a visible presence as well as assisting residents to access local services.

The Community Warden Service has ten Community Wardens and two Senior Wardens.

The wardens have the power to issue Fixed Penalty Notices for litter, dog fouling and fly tipping offences and are deployed to identified problem areas to carry out this enforcement option. The wardens assist or support a range of community safety initiatives such as cycle training in schools, community events, street football projects as well as attend residents meetings. It is now evident that the service has matured and is now integrated within the communities they serve.

Night Time Noise

Angus Council has four enforcement assistants to investigate complaints of excessive noise. The Team issue warning notices and fixed penalty

notices and have the power to seize and remove equipment found to be the source of unlawful noise. The majority of referrals to the Team come via Tayside Police.

Victim Support Angus

Victim Support is the lead voluntary organisation in Scotland helping people affected by crime and antisocial behaviour. It provides emotional support, practical help and essential information to victims, witnesses and others affected by crime. The service is free, confidential and is provided by volunteers through a network of community based victim and youth justice services and court based witness services.

The organisation provides support to victims and ensures that they are kept informed about how their complaint is being dealt with at every stage as well as providing witness support services for witnesses and victims participating in legal proceedings.

Fast Response to Vandalism

The Fast Response to Vandalism project is a service provided by Angus Council Criminal Justice Services to address and rectify minor acts of vandalism and graffiti. The public are encouraged to use the service which can be contacted through the ACCESSLine.

Delivering the Strategy

Community Safety Partnership

The Angus Community Safety Partnership provides strategic leadership to help deliver on the agreed local and national outcomes.

The Angus Community Planning Partnership has identified six priority areas of focus, these being:-

- demographics
- sustainability
- new business growth
- young people
- alcohol
- community engagement.

Community safety and antisocial behaviour have an impact on each of these areas.

Community Engagement

Community engagement and consultation with the public and key organisations by the Community Safety Partnership is vital to ensure that the aims of the strategy have a meaningful impact. Through engagement, communities have the opportunity to inform service providers of the issues they face and how they, the community, can work with agencies to develop local solutions. By doing so, this will ensure that activities meet local needs and are more likely to succeed.

The National Standards for Community Engagement and the ACPOS Community Reassurance Strategy underpin the work of this strategy.





The Way Ahead

A Structured Business Approach

The Angus Community Safety Partnership recently accepted Scottish Government recommendations by adopting the principles of the National Intelligence Model (NIM) in its delivery of services in respect to community safety and antisocial behaviour. A policing model adopted in 2000 by the Association of Chief Police Officers, the National Intelligence Model provides a structured process for the identification of priorities through analysis of information and intelligence, followed by the targeting of resources to address these issues.

In line with the principles of the Model, the Angus Community Safety Partnership now completes an annual strategic assessment that sets the priorities for the forthcoming year.

The Strategic Assessment

The Strategic Assessment seeks to identify the key local community safety and antisocial behaviour issues in Angus and uses the framework of PRICE (Prevention, Rehabilitation, Information, Communication and Enforcement).

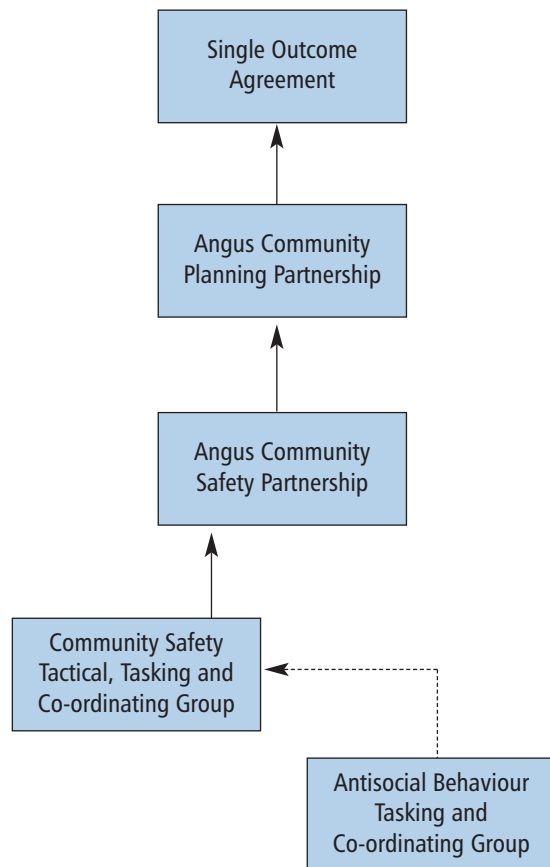

The strategic assessment allows the Angus Community Safety Partnership to clearly identify and address important local community safety and antisocial behaviour issues. To ensure delivery of these priorities, a multi-partnership Tactical and Co-ordinating Meeting is convened monthly to allocate tasks, provide resources, and track progress. The operational impact of local

antisocial behaviour problems in Angus are examined by the Antisocial Behaviour Tasking and Coordinating Group. This group uses a problem solving approach and has representation from Tayside Police, Angus Council, local housing associations and voluntary agencies.

This new approach affords the partnership flexibility to respond to emerging issues in an intelligence led and expedient manner, using resources smartly and effectively.

The structure of the Angus Community Planning Partnership and the governance arrangements for the Single Outcome Agreement will promote a much more co-ordinated approach across partner agencies for effective delivery of services in Angus.



What our Communities Say

This strategy has been informed through consultation with the public, as part of the ongoing community engagement process. A series of consultation exercises were carried out and the following issues were highlighted as being of most concern to our communities:

- Antisocial Behaviour
- Drugs & Alcohol
- Public Protection & Safety
- Road Safety
- Terrorism & Community Tensions

Community Safety Survey

In 2009, a second survey was commissioned by the Angus Community Safety Partnership to examine how safe residents feel in their community and how antisocial behaviour problems are affecting their lives. Returns from this survey will help the partnership to understand the effectiveness of services that are being provided in these areas, and assist in identifying community issues and areas where resources should be targeted.



Communication

Sharing information

To effectively manage antisocial behaviour the relevant agencies must be able to share information at a local level. Section 139 of the Antisocial Behaviour etc. (Scotland) Act 2004 enables individuals to release information to a relevant authority for the purposes of any measure in the 2004 Act, or any piece of legislation which relates to tackling antisocial behaviour. This includes exchanging information in relation to ASBO investigations, applications and other relevant matters.

The relevant authority means a local authority, a chief constable, the principal reporter, a registered social landlord, and any authority managing Housing Benefit.

There is a signed protocol for the sharing of information between the Chief Constable and Angus Council which clearly defines how this exchange of information should take place.

Diversity

The Partnership recognises that diversity is a broad agenda covering race/ethnicity, age, gender, disability, sexuality, and religion/belief and is determined to overcome the difficulties of engaging with individuals and minority

communities. For example, issues presented by the differing cultures of migrant workers continue to present a challenge for services in Angus as the local community traditionally supports a high percentage of transient seasonal workers.

The Partnership does not have its own diversity policy but partner agencies and organisations do have such policies and work to them when delivering services, including those for community safety and antisocial behaviour.

Consultation

Many agencies and individuals have been involved in the production of this Strategy. Some have been directly involved whilst others have been involved in the consultation process. A list of those involved are outlined at appendix 4.

Appendix 1: Antisocial Behaviour Enforcement Measures

The Antisocial Behaviour etc (Scotland) Act 2004 provides a range of measures, some of which are currently in use or have already been used in Angus.

- a. **Antisocial Behaviour Orders (ASBOs) (part 2)** - preventative orders directed through the court designed to protect victims of antisocial behaviour, that is behaviour that causes or is likely to cause alarm or distress. Such orders include offenders aged 12 to 15 years.
- b. **Dispersal of Groups (part 3)** - created a new power for a senior police officer to designate an area, in consultation with the local authority, where there has been significant, continuous and serious antisocial behaviour, and the presence or behaviour of groups is contributing to the problems.
- c. **Closure of Premises (part 4)** - A senior police officer can authorise that a closure notice is served on the premises if they have good reason to believe that a person has been involved in antisocial behaviour on the premises within the last three months. They can also issue a closure notice where the use of the premises is associated with significant, continuous and serious nuisance or disorder.
- d. **Noise Nuisance (part 5)** - gives local authorities extra powers to deal with noise nuisance. Local authority officers have the power to measure noise, issue warning notices and Fixed Penalty Notices to offenders. The power extends to the ability to apply for a warrant to seize any equipment which is causing noise.
- e. **The Environment (part 6)** - introduced measures for even greater use of Fixed Penalty Notices, both for littering and fly-tipping. In addition, local authorities were empowered to issue notices to remove graffiti to those responsible for street furniture, for example, phone boxes, park benches etc.
- f. **Antisocial Behaviour Notices (part 7/8)** - Part 7 deals with problems involving private tenants and gives the local authority powers to use against the landlord. Part 8 introduced a registration scheme for local authorities to prepare and maintain a public register of all private landlords in their area.
- g. **Parenting Orders (part 9)** - introduced to deal with parents who deliberately or recklessly fail their children whether on welfare grounds or by failing to take reasonable steps to prevent their child from committing crime or antisocial behaviour.
- h. **Further criminal measures (part 10)**
 - Antisocial Behaviour Orders (ASBOs) – courts empowered to make an ASBO immediately after a person has been found guilty of any criminal offence involving antisocial behaviour as, or as part of, the sentence given
 - Community Reparation Orders – A person aged 12 and over, convicted in a Sheriff or District Court of an offence involving antisocial behaviour, may be ordered to work between 10 and 100 hours so as to give something back to the community they have damaged
 - Restriction of Liberty Orders (RLOs) – provided a restriction of liberty order to people aged under 16. An offender given an RLO may be restricted to a specific place for up to 12 hours each day or not allowed to leave a specific place for up to 24 hours each day (or both) for up to 12 months
 - Ban on selling spray paint to under 16s – the act made it an offence to sell spray paint to people under 16 years of age. Authorised local authority personnel have powers to enter and inspect premises, and to seize goods, to make sure this is enforced
 - Vehicles used in a way that causes alarm, distress or annoyance - allows the police to deal with people who cause alarm, distress or annoyance to members of the public through the antisocial use of vehicles on or off public roads

i. **Fixed Penalty Notices (part 11)** – empowering the police to issue Fixed Penalty Notices for a range of antisocial behaviour offences. These include:-

- riotous behaviour while drunk in licensed premises;
- refusing to leave licensed premises when asked to do so;
- breach of the peace
- going to the toilet in a place that causes, or is likely to cause, annoyance to any other person;
- being drunk and incapable in a public place;
- continuing to play musical instruments, sing, play radios and so on after being asked to stop;
- vandalism/malicious mischief; and
- drinking alcohol where it breaks a bye-law.

Children’s hearings (part 12)

Supervision requirements: conditions restricting movement - Section 135 introduced a new power for children’s hearings to set conditions restricting movement if a young person meets the criteria for secure accommodation, as set out under section 70 (10) of the Children (Scotland) Act 1995. If a young person meets the secure criteria, children’s hearings will then consider whether a secure authorisation or a condition restricting movement is the most appropriate option

Supervision requirements: duties of local authorities - Section 136 of the Act requires local authorities to carry out the decisions of children’s hearings contained in supervision requirements. It also allows the children’s hearings to ask the reporter to apply for an order from the sheriff court asking a local authority which has not carried out its duty to do so

Failure to provide education to excluded pupils - Section 137 gives the reporter and a children’s hearing power to refer the case of a child who has been excluded from school to Scottish Ministers if it appears that the local authority concerned has failed to carry out its duty under section 14(3) of the Education (Scotland) Act 1980 to provide education to a pupil excluded from school.

Short Scottish Secure Tenancy

The Housing (Scotland) Act 2001 introduced the Short Scottish Secure Tenancy (SSST). They can be offered to new tenants under certain circumstances where a member of the household has been subject to an ASBO or where a member of the household has had an order for repossession awarded against them following conviction for a criminal offence. They can also be used in circumstances where an existing tenant has had become subject to an ASBO. The SSST offers reduced security of tenure and incorporates an agreed package of support. The support gives the opportunity for rehabilitating the individual or family involved. Where there is no recurrence of antisocial behaviour after 12 months, the tenancy converts to a Scottish Secure Tenancy.

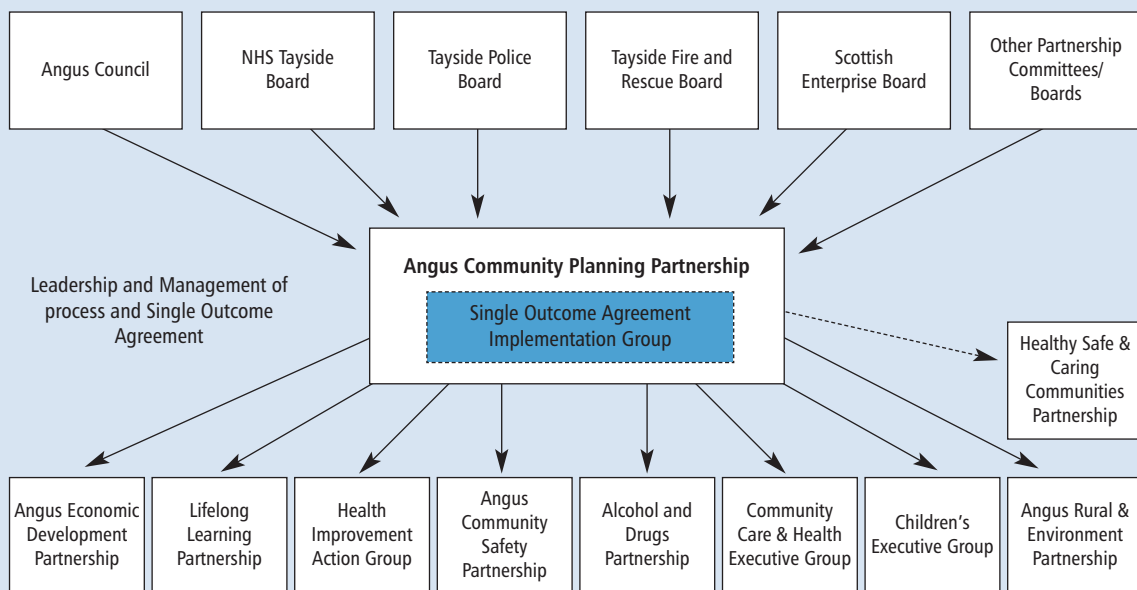
