You will have noticed our new logo for this year for the AFN. It will appear on the header of each issue as a reminder.

Each month we list a selection of funders that your group might be interested in applying to. There is ever increasing competition for funding so you have to make your application **stand out** from the rest. Of course you have to clearly tell the funder what you want to spend their money on, that your budget is realistic, and your group is well organised but funders are primarily interested in the effect their money has on people, so for example if you're a sports group, don't just tell them what equipment you need, but tell them about the type of people in your group, why your volunteers get involved, what they get out of it, how it improves people's lives. Use a short case study, use a quote from one of your members that sums up how important your group is in their lives – in other words –

Sell the **Sizzle not the Sausage.**

We have over 500 registered users now, and monthly visits are consistently high – but we'd like them to be even higher, so more people can benefit from this free resource.

The site has had a complete revamp, with fresh new looking icons, so if you've not visited it recently, take another look. But it's not just cosmetic changes that have been made. Lots of extra features have been added.

You can now:

- Save your searches and set up automatic alerts to get updated information on funds you are interested in.
- Choose between more criteria to make your search more targeted to your project.
- Have the option to view all trusts chosen, or further filter your results if there are too many.
- View results alphabetically, by deadline, maximum value, geographic scope or best match.
- Save your funding search criteria.
- Expect information to be more up to date than previously.
- Search for a particular trust's details.
- Produce a report (useful to take to a committee meeting)

We are also arranging for presentations from EFT seminars to be put on the site, and we'll let you know when this facility is available. ANGUS COUNCIL COMMUNITY GRANT SCHEME

If you are planning on applying for an event during the summer, please discuss this with us in advance, and plan to have your application to us in plenty of time for assessment.

If you are applying for an event for a second year running, please remember we can only fund 67% of the grant you received the first year. For a third year, we will fund up to 33%, and no funding will be available for a fourth year.

The exception to this is where you can show that you require money to do something significantly different or developmental. This does not mean for example, different entertainers. REGIONAL SCREEN SCOTLAND - LOCAL FILM FESTIVALS & AUDIENCE DEVELOPMENT GRANTS

The scheme - to assist film festivals, cinemas, film clubs, community groups and other bodies seeking to present a public film festival or similar unique events or audience development activities in rural, remote or under-served communities in Scotland. Tours of film festival programmes to rural and remote areas may also be eligible for support.

Amount - Grants are available up to a maximum of £5,000 per organisation in any one year.

CHURCHES

NATIONAL CHURCHES TRUST

The scheme - The National Churches Trust aims to protect and support the built heritage of churches, chapels and meeting houses throughout the UK. Applicant churches can be of any denomination or be members of an umbrella body belonging to Churches Together in Britain and Ireland. Repair grants are for both listed and unlisted churches, chapels and meeting houses of any age, as long as they are open for public worship.

In 2010 the National Churches Trust is offering the opportunity to apply for the following grants:

Repair Grants

Grants of £10,000 and above for structural repair projects that will cost more than £50,000. A structural repair means essential work to safeguard the fabric of the building.

Community Grants

Grants from £2,500 to £25,000 for providing facilities that will benefit your place of worship and local community, e.g. accessible toilets, kitchens and meeting rooms. Grants will not exceed 50% of the project cost

ENERGY

E.ON SUSTAINABLE ENERGY FUND

The scheme - The E.ON Sustainable Energy Fund offers grants to community groups and not-for-profit organisations who wish to consider and implement sustainable energy projects in their buildings. Projects that can be considered include; the purchase and installation of one or more renewable energy technologies (e.g. wind, solar thermal, PV, wood etc); the renovation of existing facilities to incorporate micro-generation technology (e.g. the reinstatement of a watermill and the purchase of a turbine to produce hydro-electricity); an energy efficiency makeover for your building that could demonstrate significant energy savings and also behavioural change amongst users; and the use of new or innovative technology to deliver either energy savings or micro-generation capacity. To be eligible organisations must benefit specific groups namely: education, vulnerable people; and people in fuel poverty.

INTELLIGENT ENERGY

The scheme – The call for this European fund will be in mid March, at which time full details will be published. Public and private bodies in the EU can apply. Projects require 3 partners from 3 member states, delivering the EU's energy efficiency and climate change objectives in a 2-3 year project. The funding is not for technological solutions, but is aimed at turning policy into action, research into best practice and also training and education and market intelligence to inform further policy development. The emphasis is on what the project will achieve. energy efficient transport (but NOT clean or alternative fuels for vehicles)

Programmes

SAVE – this covers energy efficiency for existing buildings. (e.g. using existing information) and consumer behaviour (e.g. awareness raising and evaluation of campaigns)

STEER – this covers energy efficient transport (e.g. walking, cycling initiatives, eco-driving) and capacity building on clean transport (good practice, training to adopt new services) Clean or alternative fuels for vehicles NOT included.

ALTENER – this covers renewable energy with the 3 key areas being electricity, buildings and bio energy There is also an integrated initiatives programme covering local energy leadership (networking of local authorities, capacity building) and financing for housing (to implement energy efficiency programmes)

Amount – to be confirmed. 75% funding for projects is likely

ENVIRONMENT

PEOPLE'S TRUST FOR ENDANGERED SPECIES - UK MAMMALS GRANT STATUS

The scheme - Grants for voluntary conservation organisations to support work relating to the conservation of mammals in the UK. The scheme is intended to support work in the areas of scientific research, practical habitat management work, re-introduction and monitoring programmes and educational projects.

Programmes and educational projects including:

Volunteer support and development programmes.

Public awareness campaigns.

Work on alien species if it is likely to result in benefit to a native species.

In particular, the scheme wishes to support work likely to further the aims of Biodiversity Action Plans and similar initiatives.

Deadline - 22 November 2010. The Group meets annually, usually in December, with dates being announced as soon as possible after each meeting. All applications must be received at least a month before the meeting is due to be held.

HEALTH

COMIC RELIEF YOUNG CARERS GRANTS PROGRAMME

The scheme- The Princess Royal Trust for Carers has launched the Young Carers Grant Programme 2010, open to any third sector or not for profit organisation who wishes to develop supportive services for young carers. The programme is funded by Comic Relief. There will be a single round of awards and application will be by a two stage process, beginning with an expression of interest. Applicants are asked to demonstrate how their proposed project meets with the following three specific aims:

- Reduce the extent of inappropriate caring roles for the most isolated and vulnerable young carers.
- Increase the support available for the most isolated and vulnerable young carers.
- Increase knowledge and resources to develop replicable models of support for the most isolated and vulnerable young carers.

The programme intends to fund approximately 15 projects, ideally from across the UK.

Amount - Each funded project will be awarded a maximum of £72,500 over three years.

ANGUS RURAL ENTERPRISE GRANT SCHEME

The scheme – this is an Angus Council grant scheme to support the development of small rural businesses and community groups. The grant can provide seed corn funding to non-constituted rural groups that have difficulty accessing other established sources of funding. The eligibility and the application criteria is to be reviewed to prevent duplication with other schemes and to align it with the council's new economic development strategy which focuses on the priority areas of sustainable energy, food and drink and tourism.

SOCIAL ENTREPRENEURS FUND/ MILLENNIUM AWARDS TRUST

The scheme - Firstport and Scotland Unltd work together to provide advice and funding opportunities for new start social entrepreneurs. Two main funds are available to individuals who have great ideas and the vision, passion, drive and commitment to develop them.

Social Entrepreneurs Fund

The Scottish Government's Social Entrepreneurs Fund is a £1 million fund aimed at individuals with ideas to start up new social enterprise in Scotland

Millennium Awards Trust

Scotland Unltd's Millennium Awards is part of Unltd's UK wide programme and makes awards to social entrepreneurs who want to change the world for the better.

Level 1 awards are for those with an idea but need to test it to help get it off the ground then a level 1 award could help with some of the start up costs. The turnaround time is eight weeks from when a complete application is submitted. Level 2 awards are for those who have already developed and tested an idea but need more time to implement it.

TRAINING

SANTANDER FOUNDATION

The scheme - funding must directly help disadvantaged people through -

Education and training - any activity disadvantaged people undertake where they improve their confidence in a skill or their understanding of a subject this does not have to be formal training or lead to a qualification, although those activities would be eligible too. It could be any activity disadvantaged people undertake where they improve their confidence in a skill or their understanding of a subject. Examples could include independent living skills, anger management, or improving self esteem. Other examples could include reminiscence projects for older people, art and craft sessions as well as IT classes.

Financial capability - activities which help disadvantaged people understand how to manage their money. It could include budgeting skills, accessing affordable credit as well as managing the challenges that arise from being a carer, unemployment, disability or relationship break up. Examples could be the costs of running a credit union, projects delivering financial advice and helping people to understand their benefit entitlement. Successful applications under this priority have included equipping a training kitchen for homeless people who learnt how to budget effectively for their food and then went on to apply these principals to other parts of their lives.

Amount - Grants of up to £10,000 can be awarded anywhere in the UK where there is a branch of Santander or Alliance & Leicester.

Eligibility – organisations with charitable status and credit unions can apply.

YOUTH

BREAKFAST CLUB FAMILY GRANTS PROGRAMME

The scheme - Grants are available to organisations currently hosting breakfast clubs to help them develop a sustainable family dimension. The Breakfast Club Family Grants Programme is funded by the Blue Peter Mission Nutrition appeal and administered by ContinYou. The scheme is intended to support established breakfast clubs to develop a sustainable family dimension that will benefit vulnerable or hard to reach families. HAPPY DAYS

The scheme -Charities and other groups representing disadvantaged children are eligible to apply. Happy Days provides holidays, residential trips, days out and theatre trips for disadvantaged young people, aged between 3 and 17, with special needs. The focus is on children who have learning difficulties, physical or mental disabilities and with acute, chronic or life limiting illnesses. Help is also offered to young people who have been abused or neglected, witnessed domestic violence, been bereaved or act as carers for a parent or a sibling.

The following are funded:

- Holidays for young people and their families.
- Residential trips for groups of children and young people.
- Days out for groups to hundreds of venues throughout the UK, including the seaside, zoos, theme parks, safari parks and fun fairs.
- Trips to the theatre and theatre workshops.

SEE THE DIFFERENCE – CHARITY VIDEO WEBSITE

A new website that shows charity fundraising videos and allows people to share them on other sites is expected to be launched on 23 March. The website, which is called See the Difference, has been set up in the hope of raising nearly £500m for charities in its first five years. Charities can upload videos to the site for free but will be charged 5 per cent commission on donations made by its users. The site will hold a library of videos that show specific projects being run by charities and promise to tell donors exactly how their money has been spent. The charities involved will have to undertake to spend donations on the projects shown in the videos, rather than using them as unrestricted funds. The site's founders hope that videos posted on the site will be shared on other social networking sites such as Facebook to encourage more people to give.

DISCOUNT AND FREE STUFF

Franked mail

COMMITTEE MEMBERS – ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

If you have new committee members it is important that they understand their roles and responsibilities. Remember too, that there may be recent legislation that affects your committee, so it is essential for existing members to keep up to date. A good starting point is <http://tinyurl.com/y87y37e> and <http://tinyurl.com/yhnnyqe> you can direct them to the websites, or download the information and give them an information pack of what is expected of them.

CONSULTATION ON SCIOS

The Scottish Government is currently carrying out a consultation on Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisations, (SCIOs). A SCIO is a new legal form which will allow Scottish charities to incorporate without having to become companies, and is likely to be of interest to a large number of smaller charities wishing to avoid individual board/committee members being financially and legally liable for the actions of the charity. The advantage over the company limited by guarantee route is that charities would not have to comply with both charity and company law and report to both Companies House and to OSCR as is currently the case.

DO YOU GET YOUR ACCOUNTS AUDITED?

This is a reminder that charities with an income of under £500,000 and assets of less than £2.8m (for example a building) **do not need** to get their annual accounts audited. This applies to the accounting period after 1 April 2008.

If you are paying for audited accounts you are **wasting your charity's money**.

For charities operating under these thresholds, an independent examination is all that is required by OSCR and Companies House.

If your constitution states that your accounts have to be audited – amend your constitution to “independently examined”. You will save yourself hundreds of pounds.

FUNDING SUCCESS

Kirriemuir based social enterprise; KIPCOM has been awarded a £3,977 from the Social Entrepreneurs Fund. Kipcom provides a computer and IT disposal service. By harvesting re-useable parts of old machinery, therefore diverting these from the waste stream, Kipcom is able to provide low-cost computers.
