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BACKGROUND TO THIS REPORT

As from April 2013, the Police and Fire Reform (Scotland) Act 2012 has required Police Scotland to produce and publish a Local Policing Plan (LPP) for each local authority area. The LPP clearly sets out the policing priorities for Angus.

Performance in relation to the identified policing priorities is monitored and reviewed internally on a weekly basis. Quarterly reports are produced to allow scrutiny by Angus Council Scrutiny and Audit Committee. This report covers the period from 1^{st} April to 30^{th} June 2016.

Data provided in this report is for information purposes to allow Board Members to conduct their scrutiny responsibilities.

This report will make reference to crime groupings. Groups 1-4 refer to an amalgamation of four crime groups. They are Group 1, consisting of violent crime; Group 2 covering sexual offences; Group 3 covers a wide range of crimes of dishonesty; and Group 4 includes vandalism, fire-raising and malicious mischief.

Serious and Organised Crime

Tackling Serious and Organised Crime Groups (SOCG's) remains a key focus for Police Scotland and officers within Angus.


Local officers are supported by a variety of national assets and continue to target those involved in the supply of controlled drugs which is an issue that is embedded with in SOCG's


The number of detections for drugs supply, cultivation and production has increase by 40% compared to the same period last year.

In addition, the number of persons reported for being possession of controlled drugs has increased by 45.9 % compared to the same period last year.

We continue to work with communities and partners to maximise local intelligence and then carry out pre planned activity to disrupt and detect criminality. This is routine business for Operation Slate.

Public Protection and Safety

In relation to Public Protection and Safety, there has been an overall decrease in violent crime in Angus compared to the same period last year. This is welcome but we are still ahead of the five year average with the majority of violence still occurring indoors.

There has been a 25% decrease in Serious Assaults from 20 incidents to 15.

The overall total number of group 1, serious violent crime, has also reduced by around 9.4%.

There has been a 7.3% decrease in petty assaults as compared to last year. Again this is encouraging but the overall numbers remain high and ahead of the five year average. The majority of petty assaults are still occurring indoors with recent analysis showing alcohol to be a considerable contributory factor.

Domestic abuse accounts for a large proportion of the overall numbers with reported incidents more than doubled in the last five years. However this period shows a reduction of 8.3 % compared to the previous period.

The overall number of robberies remains low with a 16.6 % increase in the detection rate. Focused activity on those responsible for perpetrating these crimes has proved to be successful and this work continues.

Despite a variety of national and international incidents the number of Hate Crimes reported in Angus continues to reduce. For the previous period 24 crimes were reported compared to 17 crimes this year.


The number of group 2 crimes of indecency reported over the period has reduced by 15.5%. It is too early at this stage to say weather this is a real change or if the overall increasing trend continues. Online and social media offences continue to be prevalent.

Intelligence lead stop search continues to be useful tool in keeping our communities safe with a positive detection rate of 26.6%.

Road Safety

The strategic priority for road safety is keeping people safe on the roads of Angus.

Angus officers continue to work with our colleagues in the Divisional Road Policing Unit (DRPU) and the Trunk Road Policing Group (TRPG) to tackle road crime.

Although there has been no increase there was still one fatality on Angus roads over the reporting period. This is still one tragedy too many.


Through working with partners 2 fewer people were serious injured equating to a reduction of 18.2 %. 22 fewer people were slightly injured equating to a reduction in 62.9 %.


No children were killed or serious injured on our roads

Officers continue to be involved in speed and casualty reduction operations in our community. This is on our trunk roads, rural roads and within built up areas. Officers continue to target inconsiderate and dangerous parking.

Warmer temperatures combined with heavy rainfall make our roads greasy and slippery. Please encourage our communities to drive safely.

Antisocial Behaviour

The overall number of crimes in Angus across all crime types has reduced by approximately 10.3%. This is positive, however within this trend there are some areas that have increased, complaints of anti social behaviour and disorder being two such examples.

Complaints of disorder have increased by 18.5 % from 955 reports last year to 1132 for this reporting period. As with our violence picture many of these incidents occur indoors. Another contributory factor is the increase in juvenile and youth offenders.


The dedicated community SPOCS and staff within the Community Safety HUB, The Mart, Forfar, proactively work with partners to address Anti Social Behaviour across Angus. The direction of travel is encouraging and the reduction in the number of vandalisms 301 to 200 reflects this work. The 33.6 % reduction is accompanied by an 8.9 % increase in the detection rate.


Officers are regularly tasked with patrolling problematic areas and proactively visiting persistent offenders. This is complemented by the repeat caller process where identified officers are allocated specific issues to problem solve with partners. This approach will be built on as we move forward.

During the previous period there were no reported incidents of persons consuming alcohol within a designated place.

Likewise there were no reports of our young people socialising in outdoor 'drinking dens'. There is some evidence to suggest that this activity has moved 'indoors'. This is being explored with the Alcohol & Drugs Partnership.

Theft and Scams

People feeling safe within their homes in Angus is vitally important.

The total number of Theft by Housebreaking (including attempts in Angus) has increased from 45 crimes last year to 51 crimes for this period.

The overall detection rate for this period has increased by approximately 8 % from 33.3 % to 43.1 %.


However, it should be noted that the number of Domestic dwellings broken into has reduced from 24 to 10 compared to the same period last year. There is considerable pro active work conducted in this area of policing. A divisional investigative approach led by DCI Andrew Patrick complements and supports this work.


The number of Theft by Shopliftings has increased by 67.6 % from 68 reports last year to 114 for the same period this year. At this stage it is difficult to say what the reasons could be for this but should be noted that the current rate is still below the five year average.

Officers in Angus continue to do preventative work with repeat offenders and work in partnership with other to offer crime prevention advice and support.

It is worthy of note that the overall number of crimes of dishonesty in Angus, which encompasses the reported data of, has reduced.
