BACKGROUND TO THIS REPORT

As from April 2013, the Police and Fire Reform (Scotland) Act 2012 has required Police Scotland to produce and publish a Local Policing Plan (LPP) for each local authority area. The LPP clearly sets out the policing priorities for Angus.

Performance in relation to the identified policing priorities is monitored and reviewed internally on a weekly basis. Quarterly reports are produced to allow scrutiny by Angus Council Scrutiny and Audit Committee. This report covers the period from 1^{st} April to 30^{th} September 2016.

Data provided in this report is for information purposes to allow Board Members to conduct their scrutiny responsibilities.

This report will make reference to crime groupings. Groups 1-4 refer to an amalgamation of four crime groups. They are Group 1, consisting of violent crime; Group 2 covering sexual offences; Group 3 covers a wide range of crimes of dishonesty; and Group 4 includes vandalism, fire-raising and malicious mischief.

Serious and Organised Crime

Tackling Serious and Organised Crime Groups (SOCG's) remains a key focus for Police Scotland and officers within Angus.

Local officers are supported by a variety of national assets and continue to target those involved in the supply of controlled drugs. This is an issue that is embedded with in SOCG's

The number of detections for drugs supply, cultivation and production has increased by 38.9 % compared to the same period last year.


In addition, the number of persons reported for being possession of controlled drugs has increased by 7.3 % compared to the same period last year.


The increased level of work and detections is indicative of the effort and focus placed on this work locally. We continue to work with communities and partners to maximise local intelligence and then carry out pre planned activity to disrupt and detect criminality through Operation Slate.

Linked to Human Trafficking and Exploitation; there was a recent multi agency operation in relation to anti-slavery. This was supported by local and divisional officers.

In a different strand of Serious and Organised Crime, local officers were and continue to be actively involved in complaints of cattle theft and the recovery of stolen cattle.

Public Protection and Safety

In relation to Public Protection and Safety, there has been a slight increase in Group 1, Crimes of Violence in Angus compared to the same period last year. An increase from 56 to 58 crimes equating to a rise of 3.6%. This is mainly due to an increase in associated online internet offences.

However, overall in Angus there has been 14.6% reduction in total violent crime.

There has been a 12.1% decrease in Serious Assaults from 33 incidents to 29.

The reduction in the number of petty assaults continues with a 14.8% decrease compared to the same period last year. A reduction from 757 to 645 incidents.

The reduction in petty assaults is welcome and encouraging. However, overall numbers remain high and slightly ahead of the five year average. The majority of petty assaults in Angus occur indoors with alcohol being a contributory factor.

Domestic violence accounts for a large proportion of the overall numbers of reported assaults in Angus. Overall domestic incidents in Angus have more than doubled in the last five years but the previous period highlights a reduction of 13.9 % in overall reported incidents and 24.2 % reduction in recorded crime.

The overall number of robberies remains low with a 10% increase in the detection rate.

The number of Hate Crimes in Angus continues to reduce. For the previous period 42 crimes were reported compared to 31 crimes this year. These crimes currently

have a detection rate of 97.1% an increase of 10.7 % compared to the previous period.


The number of group 2 crimes of indecency reported over the period has reduced by 17.6%. This continues the reduction from the previous quarter but this area of work continues to be a challenge with online and social media offences continuing to be prevalent.


Intelligence led stop search activity highlights a positive detection rate of 27.7%.





Road Safety

The strategic priority for road safety is keeping people safe on the roads of Angus.

Local officers continue to work with our colleagues in the Divisional Road Policing Unit (DRPU) and the Trunk Road Policing Group (TRPG) to tackle road safety issues and associated criminality.


Tragically there were four fatalities on the roads in Angus during the reporting period. These incidents impact on families and the wider community. No children were killed on our roads.


Work on education and impacting driver behaviour continues with partners. There has been a significant reduction of 27.8 % in persons seriously injured and a 70.4% reduction in persons slightly injured. These are good indicators of overall road safety.

Officers continue to be involved in speed and casualty reduction operations in our community. This is on our trunk roads, rural roads and within built up areas. Officers continue to target inconsiderate and dangerous parking.

Mornings and evenings are getting darker; please encourage our communities to drive safely.

Antisocial Behaviour

The overall number of crimes in Angus across all crime types has reduced by approximately 13.1 %.


Within this reduction, the total number of antisocial behaviour incidents has reduced by 3.7%. However, the overall number of complaints of disorder has increased by 21.7% from 2045 reports last year to 2488 for this reporting period.


The overall disorder number relates to incidents that are reported to the Police and recorded on our command and control system. It is worthy of note that over the same recording period the number of associated disorder type crimes reduced from 719 to 485. A reduction of 32.5%.

Incidences of vandalism remain down, less than the previous period and below the five year average. The 14% reduction is accompanied by a 3.9% increase in the detection rate.

The number of alcohol seizures in a designated public place remains low and there are still no reports of outdoor 'drinking dens' involving our young people. This activity has certainly moved indoors to party flats. This is something we continue to work on, with our partners in the Community Safety Hub.

Theft and Scams

Theft by Housebreaking and crimes of dishonesty remains a priority for officers in Angus.

The overall detection rate for all forms of housebreaking, including attempts has increased by 5.5% from 29.5% to 35%.

Over the last period the total number of housebreaking has increased from 78 to 100 an increase of 28.2 %. This remains below the five year average.

The number of housebreakings to domestic premises has reduced from 43 to 29 reported incidents for this period. This is a reduction of 32.6 %.


The number of sheds / garages broken into during this period has increased from 20 to 53 reported incidents. The detection rate for these offences is 49.1%.


Considerable pro-active police work is conducted in this area of policing to target offenders and keep people safe.

The overall number of Theft by Shoplifting has increased slightly but this represents a downward trend from a difficult position earlier in the year.

It is worthy of note that the overall number of crimes of dishonesty in Angus has reduced by 6.6%
