# **BACKGROUND TO THIS REPORT**

As from April 2013, the Police and Fire Reform (Scotland) Act 2012 has required Police Scotland to produce and publish a Local Policing Plan (LPP) for each local authority area. The LPP clearly sets out the policing priorities for Angus.

Performance in relation to the identified policing priorities is monitored and reviewed internally on a weekly basis. Quarterly reports are produced to allow scrutiny by Angus Council Scrutiny and Audit Committee. This report covers the period from  $1^{st}$  April to  $30^{th}$  September 2015.

Data provided in this report is for information purposes to allow Board Members to conduct their scrutiny responsibilities.

This report will make reference to crime groupings. Groups 1-4 refer to an amalgamation of four crime groups. They are Group 1, consisting of violent crime; Group 2 covering sexual offences; Group 3 covers a wide range of crimes of dishonesty; and Group 4 includes vandalism, fire-raising and malicious mischief.


# **Serious and Organised Crime**

Tackling Serious and Organised Crime Groups (SOCGs) throughout Angus remains a key focus for the Area Commander. A small unit of 5 officers based in Arbroath exploits every intervention and enforcement opportunity as they arise.

The team are well supported by Intelligence, Proactive and Operational Support Units based throughout the wider Division.

Angus Command also maintains a 2 officer team dedicated to the TISS project, where intensive support is provided to identified and engaging individuals who suffer from addictions and are involved in criminality to fund these. The team works very closely with Criminal Justice Social Work, various third sector providers as well the Procurator Fiscal service.

# **Public Protection and Safety**

Overall crimes of violence have increased by 3.6% this year compared to the same period last year. Serious assaults have also seen an increase from 24 during this period last year to 33 this year. However we have maintained a solid detection rate of 97%.

Robberies have seen a significant reduction across Angus LPA with a decrease of 41.2%, which equates to 7 fewer robberies compared to the same period last year.

Police Scotland and Angus LPA continue to have a zero tolerance approach to domestic abuse. This quarter has seen a small increase in the number of reported domestic abuse incidents, a rise of 1.5%. We have ongoing approaches to assist and support victims of domestic abuse and continue to work with our partners in this respect. We robustly monitor prisoner release processes and conduct perpetrator visits.

The area commander continues as the Chairperson of the Angus Violence Against Women Partnership, which is a thriving and very well supported group and includes representation from all statutory and many voluntary groups.




# **Road Safety**


The strategic priority for road safety is keeping people safe on the roads of Angus.

This period has seen an increase of 100% in the number of people killed on the roads in Angus, with 4 people having tragically lost their lives. There has been an improvement in those both seriously injured and slightly injured during this period compared to the same period last year, with a reduction of 5.3% and 14.5%, respectively.

No children were killed or seriously injured on our roads.





#### **Antisocial Behaviour**

We continue to work with our partners to target those individuals who commit antisocial behaviour in our community. In comparison to the same period last year we have achieved a further drop in the number of complaints of disorder reported, from 2271 to 2031, a reduction of 10.6%.

The consumption of alcohol in public places within Angus has increased by 50% which equates to 2 additional detections. We will continue to direct our attention to areas where this behaviour is conducted and work with our partners to provide reassurance in these areas.

### **Theft and Scams**


The number of instances of theft by housebreaking (including attempts) has decreased by 31.3% compared to the same period last year and is currently 54 below the five year average. Detection rates for housebreaking have increased by almost 8%. This can be, in part, attributed to the work being carried out by officers across the division.

With the onset of winter we cannot and will not become complacent.

Theft by shoplifting has decreased by 20.3% and the detection rate is 76.2%. Good partnership working with retail premises is crucial in maintaining these high rates, with loss prevention advice being given to premises at risk. As we move towards the festive period we will continue to work with our partners to target this type of crime.

In conjunction with the Angus Council Protection Officer, Trading Standards Department and Social Work, a virtual Financial Abuse Support Team has been introduced to deal with reports of financial scamming. The team can be activated within hours of a report being received by any agency and an assessment made as to how best to (1) assess vulnerability (2) take steps to prevent any further loss, and (3) which agency is best placed to lead an enquiry. The team has already dealt with a significant number of referrals.
