ANGUS ADULT PROTECTION COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT

1 The Chair of the Angus Adult Protection Committee is required to submit a biennial report to the Scottish Government under Section 46 of the Adult Support and Protection (Scotland) Act 2007.

2. SIGNIFICANT INFORMATION

<u>The Biennial Report</u> is a general report on the exercise of the Angus Adult Protection Committee's functions during the two years 2012-2014.

2.1 Key achievements for 2012-2014 include:

- An Adult Early Screening Group has been established a multi agency group to consider all Adult Concern/Vulnerable Persons Reports submitted by Police Scotland, the main source of adult protection referrals in Angus
- There is evidence of improved public awareness of adult protection issues
- Nearly all adults feel safer after action through the adult protection procedures has been taken
- A Financial Harm Sub Committee has been established and Angus Council has adopted a policy on financial harm
- Adult protection and financial harm training is now being delivered to community police officers in Angus and to students of the Dundee University social work degree course
- Suicide awareness training is provided to staff in Minor Injuries Units throughout Angus
- Multi-agency case file audits and reviews have been completed enabling staff to identify good practice and learning opportunities, and to inform improvement plans
- Third sector representation on the Angus Adult Protection Committee has been expanded to provide valuable input regarding the views of service users
- The AAPC is now represented on the local Hate Incident Multi-Agency Panel ensuring services in adult protection are responsive to local people and to promote good relationships, diversity and tolerance between social groups and communities in Angus.

2.2 The Angus Adult Protection Committee Business Plan for 2014-2015 is attached to the biennial report. Key actions planned for the period 2014-2015 include:

- Raising public awareness of adult protection issues, in particular financial harm and financial scams
- Working with partner agencies such as Trading Standards to protect the "more vulnerable" adults of Angus from harm
- Ensure adults at risk are protected from harm through coherent operational protocols within and across agencies
- Completion of an operational instruction for staff regards harm in care homes (Large Scale Investigations)
- Sustaining a quality assurance system which includes case file audits and reviews, and self-evaluations of adults in the community and in care homes
- Ensuring that effective training in adult protection is available to statutory, private and third sector staff in Angus
- Engaging with service users to ascertain their views in relation to the adult protection process in Angus.

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
