#### CYCLING, WALKING AND SAFER STREETS FUND – PROGRAMME OF WORKS

#### REPORT BY DIRECTOR OF INFRASTRUCTURE

#### ABSTRACT

This report updates the Committee on the delivery of the programme of projects funded in 2018/19 through the Cycling, Walking and Safer Street fund and seeks approval of the programme of projects to be funded during 2019/20.

#### 1. **RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended that the Committee:

- (i) notes the amended programme of projects undertaken during 2018/19; and
- (ii) approves the programme of projects to be undertaken during financial year 2019/20.

# 2. ALIGNMENT TO THE ANGUS LOCAL OUTCOMES IMPROVEMENT PLAN/CORPORATE PLAN

#### 3. BACKGROUND

3.1 The Cycling, Walking and Safer Streets (CWSS) fund is a ring-fenced capital grant from Transport Scotland and was established in 2001. The funding was initially set to run until 2011/12, however was extended for a further three years to the end of 2014/15. Since then, a further allocation has been provided on an annual basis. The allocation for 2019/20 is £191,000.

#### 4. CURRENT POSITION

4.1 A programme of works to be undertaken in 2018/19 was approved by Committee on 29 May 2018 (Report No. 176/18 refers). A summary of the projects undertaken during 2018/19 is attached to this report (**Appendix 1**).

#### 5. PROPOSALS

- 5.1 A summary of the proposed programme of projects to be undertaken in 2019/20 is attached to this report (**Appendix 2**).
- 5.2 The projects were proposed by a public consultation exercise which involved an article being published in the local press, our website, and social media platforms (Facebook and Twitter). The article invited members of the public to submit ideas and suggestions on what could be done to make travel safer where they live and to encourage active travel in their area through cycling and walking. One of the sites was suggested by an elected member.

5.3 The projects were assessed against predetermined criteria of the grant and to determine the extent to which they meet strategic objectives; link with other walking and cycling initiatives; and contribute to child safety, through for example, safer routes to schools. These assessments were undertaken by officers from the Schools & Learning, Infrastructure and Communities Directorates.

#### 6. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 6.1 The ring-fenced capital grant allocation for 2019/20 is £191,000.The overall programme of projects, as detailed in Appendix 2, which detail the estimated costs for each project, will be contained within this allocation.
- 6.2 Any additional on-going maintenance costs associated with these capital projects will require to be contained within future years revenue budgets of the directorates responsible for their upkeep.
- 6.3 The funding of CWSS projects will greatly assist the Council in meeting its aims and objectives contained in various strategies and full use will be made of the available allocation.

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




