ABSTRACT

The aim of this paper is to inform the Board regarding of a range of statutory and/or formally remitted groups that Angus IJB members, officers and staff are routinely working with in order to meet its duties and health and social care responsibilities.

1.0 RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Integration Joint Board note the contents of this report and the attached appendix.

2.0 BACKGROUND

2.1 On a regular basis members, officers and staff of Angus Health and Social Care Partnership work in conjunction with others within Angus and across Tayside to ensure that services are provided in a fit and proper way. Working groups take many forms but a number of them involve collaborative working with other agencies across Angus or Tayside. Many working groups will have an operational focus, others will have a governance role. The status of work for those that do have a governance role will be of interest to the IJB.

It is therefore the intention to provide the IJB with an annual update each year of the status of the main groups that do fulfil a governance role but are not under the direct management of the Health and Social Care Partnership. Information is generally available separately regarding these groups and this report aims to bring this information together for Board members, so they have sight of the breadth of some of the work undertaken.
