Background	Addressing child poverty is a priority for both Angus Council and the Angus Community Planning Partnership. The economic impact of the Covid pandemic has increased the level of child poverty within Angus. Over many years the numbers of school pupils who are taking a school meal has been in decline, a trend that has worsened following the return to school after recent Covid restrictions. This under utilisation of school meal uptake includes those who are eligible for free school meals and is particularly noticeable in Secondary schools. This results in pupils, including those living in low income households, potentially missing out on a nutritious meal with the resulting detrimental impact on their health and ability to learn. The percentage uptake of meals in all Council areas of Tayside show that there is significant scope for improvement. Recent developments regarding the expansion of universal free school meals (UFSM) to all primary school pupils give great cause for optimism. Tayside Contracts and the constituent Councils aim to identify and implement other measures which can achieve a sustained uptake in school meal uptake across Tayside. Reports on Child Poverty have been considered by Angus Council and specific reports on the uptake of school meals have been consider by the Tayside Contracts Joint Committee. This project will progress the actions agreed through these reports.	
Purpose	The purpose of this project is to deliver a sustainable increase in the proportion of school age children and young people who are taking a school meal. The project will particularly target those individuals who are eligible for free school meals and who are at present not taking up this offer. Increasing uptake within this group could reduce their family's expenditure, thereby helping to address child poverty across Angus. An overall improvement in school meal uptake will increase the health, educational and economic benefits that can be achieved through the school meal system.	
Strategic Objectives (including SOAP)	The project will contribute to the following SOAP objectives: • Eliminate children living in poverty through work with partners & business to intervene early, create economic opportunity, while also reducing costs and increasing income for people. • Eliminate barriers to accessing the right services at the right time, ensuring the availability of early support for individuals, families and businesses. • Eliminate inefficiencies within activities, making the best use of resources and technologies, leading to a higher level of consistency and productivity. • Reduce the impact of climate change by being a major contributor to achieving Scotland's national climate change goals, as leaders in clean growth, environmental stewardship and sustainability. • Create equity by focusing services on those who need them most. • Create equity by focusing services on those who need them most. • Create stronger partnerships through collaboration in the planning and delivery of services which benefit the people of Angus. Achievement of the above objectives will be measured through the following indicators: • Overall school meal uptake at an individual school and year group level. • Proportion of those eligible for free school meals who take up this offer. • Improved customer satisfaction in the school meal offer. • Reduction in the unutilised production capacity in Tayside Contracts' Central Production Unit (CPU). • Adoption of service changes and improvements across the three Tayside council areas.

Ignite consultancy support to deliver the project and develop recommendations and resulting actions through service design is required. This totals £40,000.
