No, The UK Government announced the launch of the Levelling Up Fund in March 2021. It applies to the whole of the UK. The fund is jointly managed by HM Treasury (HMT), the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) and the Department for Transport (DfT) to invest £4.8 billion in high value local infrastructure. It focuses on the needs of individual places and the strategic case for investment. While the Fund is open to every local area, it is especially intended to support investment in places where it can make the biggest difference to everyday life, including ex-industrial areas, deprived towns, and coastal communities. It is also designed to help local areas select genuine local priorities for investment by putting local stakeholder support, including the local MP where they want to be involved, at the heart of its mission.

Angus Council has been approached by the committee of Brechin Caledonian Railway to apply as lead applicant to the UK Levelling Up Fund. Caledonian Railway has in the past and continues to be well supported by Angus Council. The volunteer led committee regularly engage and have strong links with Economic Development, Strategic Policy & Project Team, and the Roads Departments.

The committee are in the process of developing a long-term strategic plan for the railway and they are keen to link their plan with both the Council and local objectives. Initially the committee did not consider Levelling Up Funding when it was first launched. Following the announcements of the successful projects, they have explored in more detail and see it as a potential fit for the future development of the railway which will have an Angus wide benefit.

This is an ambitious project, heritage railways in the UK provide enormous contributions to their local regions attracting global visitors. This project will have major regional and national significance with the potential to unlock substantial economic, social and environmental benefits for the Angus community.

Project objectives are:

- Development of Brechin Station environs
- Extension of the existing railway from Bridge of Dun to Montrose (Network Rails connection) including supporting infrastructure
- Inclusion of an active travel corridor
- Development of House of Dun Environs
- Research into the conversion of trains from diesel to hydrogen fuel

Levelling Up applications go through a robust three stage process and are assessed on Strategic Fit, Value for Money, and Deliverability. The fund is open to every local area and it is intended to support investment in places where it can make a difference to everyday life, including ex-industrial areas, deprived towns and coastal communities.

Brechin has some significant levels of deprivation as identified by the Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation (SIMD). The residential area to the north of the historic core, Brechin West, is mostly affluent. Parts of central Brechin, around the Lidl supermarket and former railway station contain some levels of social deprivation. In East Brechin, particularly the residential areas between Montrose Street (A935) and the River South Esk, have above average levels of deprivation, with parts of Brechin East falling within the 20% most deprived wards in Scotland.[1]

A similar picture emerges in relation to income deprivation and child poverty as well as the number of out-of-work benefit recipients. For example, in parts of Brechin East, 23% of the population are classified as income deprived.

School attendance rate is 81%; attainment of school leavers is 4.91; working age people with no qualifications is 130; 5% of young people aged 16 – 19 are not participating in education, employment or training; 7% of young people aged 17 - 21 from the area go on to a University education.

The Brechin Railway Committee are in the process of developing a long-term strategic plan for the railway and they are keen to link their plan with both the Council and local objectives: Child Poverty, Angus Local Transport Strategy, Community Plan 2017-2030, Angus Travel Strategy for Angus etc. Linking Brechin Caledonian Railway long term plan to Angus Council strategies and plans will have a positive impact on the people and area of Brechin through increased health and wellbeing, development of skills and volunteering, active travel opportunities and infrastructure improvements.

The Levelling Up Fund is jointly managed by HM Treasury (HMT), the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG) and Department of Transport. The fund is delivered through local authorities who must act as lead partner.

Analysis and feedback provided from the unsuccessful round one application highlighted the need for Angus Council to be more ambitious in their project proposals.

Brechin Caledonian Railway has requested Angus Council apply to the second round of the Levelling Up Fund on their behalf. The bid value is £15, 667,745 and is on a more significant scale than the round one bid supported.

CLT discussions have taken place on applications and the project management required by Angus Council on behalf of third-party applicants including financial and legal risks. The terms and conditions of Levelling Up Funding require the Council to comply with several terms and conditions which have similarities to external funding that the Council has supported in the past. If successful in securing Levelling Up Funding project delivery would be through a third party, putting a significant financial risk on the Council and additional pressures on staff involved in the financial/non-financial monitoring and reporting to UK Government.

Brechin Caledonian Railway has carried out consultation over time to support the development of the railway and their current proposal. Brechin Railway started as a heritage railway in 1979. Since then, it has developed a strong brand and is a key part of the Angus Tourism offering. The organisation have contributed in excess of £20million to the local economy in the last 10 years and continue to show annual growth. A study showed Heritage Railways across the UK provided more than £250million to the UK economy in 2014 and there continues to be considerable growth in the market as a non-enthusiast tourism offering. They also provide community support through education and training as well as supporting other community groups.

Brechin Caledonian has carried out a railway engagement exercise with local community groups and organisations. Letters of support and individual endorsements will be supplied as evidence of engagement.
