All councils need to look at the bigger picture of what intensive farming is doing to the planet. We already have over 800 mega farms in the uk, and most of the intensive chicken farms are supplied with feed from deforested areas such as in Brazil, to grow soya and other human edible crops to feed the chickens. Please check where the food will come from. Also much transport will be needed to provide food, take birds to slaughter, bring new birds, remove waste, adding to pollution

Yes farming is vitally important, but plant based crops for humans are needed, not more chicken meat, with its risk of avian flu. We already have an avian flu crisis in the uk, and are risking another pandemic with every new chicken farm that is produced

64,000 chickens will produce a lot of waste product, which will pollute local air and rivers. Although animal welfare is not considered in planning applications, morally it should be. Chickens kept for meat will have to live in their own waste until taken for slaughter. The ammonia and nitrate burns their legs and causes respiratory difficulties for the birds. Although free range, the amount of space they have at full size will be equivalent to an A4 sheet of paper. Unless RSPCA approved they will be fast growing, which means their legs will not support their weight, so they grow to full size in 6 weeks but suffer a lot of pain, many die before being taken for slaughter. Thinning is often carried out, where part of the flock is removed before the main flock. This is extremely stressful for the birds.

Farmers need to look at other environmentally ways of farming, which the government is supporting now with grants and new schemes to encourage rewilding, and public goods for public money which this farmer could look into. see https://www.vegansociety.com/take-action/campaigns/grow-green

Good evening Mr Kelly,

I would like to object to the construction of the proposed IPU at Cononsyth Farm for a number of reasons as expressed below.

64000 chickens will inevitably produce vast amounts of manure, and chicken manure has a very high ammonia content which causes a particularly unpleasant odour, while within the sheds there will be some control of this odour, the outside areas will not be controlled and those of us living downwind will suffer the effects of this. During the consultation process Cogeo refused to detail where the manure would be stored and dried. Chicken litter can also be contaminated with pathogens, including bacteria, fungi and viruses; antibiotics and antibiotic-resistant genes; growth hormones such as egg and meat boosters; heavy metals; and pesticides. Surface water runoff from the freerange area will not be controlled and these contaminants and pathogens will easily flow into existing watercourses and the groundwater supply where some residents draw their potable water.

Airborne pollution is a known and well documented issue with poultry units and can cause serious respiratory diseases and other health issues. Whilst the proposed IPU may indeed include fans and filters designed to high standards these will require be maintained by regular, costly maintenance to maintain these standards. As this whole proposal is clearly profit driven I remain extremely doubtful that the required investment in time and money will be forthcoming, especially as the applicant has ensured that the development is not near to, or upwind of their residence.

Living in relatively close proximity to the existing infrastructure of Cononsyth farms we are already adversely affected by noise pollution from the biomass sheds and the wind turbine. Adding noise from 32 extractor fans and 12 inlet fans will only exacerbate the noise pollution of our quiet rural area. The existing sheds at Cononsyth also put out considerable volumes of light pollution and again further development on this scale will only make matters worse, not only for the residents who enjoy the dark skies that we should enjoy in a rural area, but also for the nocturnal wildlife such as the various species of bats that live in the area.

Regular flooding is already an issue on the local roads and in some gardens in this area, adding the additional runoff from a large area of hardstanding will only add to these flooding issues. The existing pond at Cononsyth is already prone to algal blooms during the warmer months and has caused illnesses in local pets, adding further nutrient and bacteria rich runoff from the proposed development cannot be a good thing.

Although living in the countryside comes with an expectation of mice and rat issues these are usually small in number and easily managed. The addition of an extremely large and easily accessed food source in the local area will inevitably lead to an explosion in vermin numbers for local residents to deal with. As you are aware dealing with mouse and rat infestations is not only unpleasant, costly and potentially harmful to health, for humans as well as pets, but rats especially can cause a huge amount of damage to property. Not to mention the negative impact rats have on nesting birds at a time when our native songbirds are in decline with large numbers of species found locally already on the Birds of Conservation Concern Red List. Full list available on the RSPB website.

Our rural road network is already in a poor state of repair, increased movements of heavy vehicles will only further degrade the condition of the road network. The local roads are also frequented by large numbers of non-motorised users and increased trafficking will inevitably lead to accidents.

Living in a rural area we all value the access we have to the countryside; the token effort of including an informal path through an area which will be foul smelling and potentially hazardous to health will in no way compensate for the loss of amenity we will all suffer if this development is allowed.

In a time of climate emergency it is difficult to understand the climate benefit of removing prime agricultural land and constructing these high energy, polluting intensive farming units. These units have a limited lifespan, but the loss of prime agricultural land will be permanent. Add to this land loss the carbon footprint of the construction, operation, and maintenance of these units this cannot be conducive to fulfilling the aims of the Local Development Plan.

Protecting the environmental and cultural assets that contribute to the quality of life that is possible here. Hence, this proposal is contrary to the Local Plan and should be rejected.

In addition :-

It is now universally known that these type of factories are totally unnecessary, a nuisance, a danger to the population, the environment and cause untold harm and suffering to the poultry being reared in those "So called" free range conditions.

Surely, as a civilised society we are above endorsing and condoning such mass production units.

Today the emphasis is on the "Green Environment" and rightly so. There is nothing "Green" or Environmentally Friendly about this proposal.

There is a surplus of these units in Scotland and a number are presently on the market for sale.

We do not need any more.

One only has to read the Impact Assessment Report to realise this is not am impartial or independent assessment or appraisal of this proposed mass production unit. It has been commissioned and paid for by the applicant and as such cannot be relied upon to give independent or impartial opinions. For example the report gives opinions without being able to access certain required high topographical areas since they are not within the applicant's ownership.

In respect of noise, I would question statements such as " We would not expect a significant increase in the noise levels". This statement means nothing and gives the applicant a free hand to increase to maximum allowable levels. Although an allowable 55 Decibel level used to be allowed within a property, I certainly would not like to live under such conditions. The ventilation fans regardless of what this report is trying to portray are very noisy and sound does travel, especially at night.

Scottish Water state they cannot guarantee a constant water supply and therefore the applicant should investigate a private supply and storage. Water is an essential part of such breeding units and without a guarantee of ample water supply this application should be rejected.

To conclude the nuisance factors in respect of noise, contamination, air pollution, increased traffic, danger to health and the environment all must be sufficient reasons for this application to be rejected.

Lastly, I would ask all Councillors on the Planning Committee - "Would you like this proposal on your doorstep". If your answer is yes, then perhaps a circular to all your Constituents outlining your reasons why you decided to support this application.

These factors include such topics as emissions, monitoring, waste". In the context of the application, waste will include hen manure, therefore making it subject to the The Waste (Scotland) Regulations 2012. In short, a full plan for the management of manure will be necessary, making the applicant legally responsible for all aspects of the handling, storage, treatment, transport and eventual use of the material, even when it leaves the applicant's land. This will include the development of risk assessments and method statements in conjunction with local authorities and other stakeholders wherever the manure is to be used. In short a 'manure plan' is required, which the applicant has not provided

ALDP Policy TC15 Employment Development. The applicant claims that this development will offer four jobs, but has consistently failed to confirm what job roles they will actually be, that they will be new and full time, and where the four workers will be drawn from, making this assertion baseless, and (probably) of no immediate employment benefit to job seekers living nearby Another unfounded assertion from the applicant, is that the land selected for development has low yield, when compared to other land on the Cononsyth estate. No evidence of this has been presented to support this, and such evidence would need to be in the form of data from several years in order for it to be significant. Also, when making this assertion, the applicant has referred solely to mean the area where the sheds are planned to be, making no comment at all about the loss of a further 80 acres of prime agricultural land to the area where the hens will free range

Also destroyed is ca. 50 metres of dry stone wall, with more being lost if passing places are built on the U467. These walls form important habitat for grass snakes, birds, and invertebrates, lichens, mosses and ferns. The Environmental Impact Assessment does not include the margins and walls of the U467

ALDP Policy DS1 SEA Implications Angus Council supports, "new development in locations that are well related to the existing form and pattern of development and therefore the existing transport network" The development doesn't conform to the existing form and pattern of development, and requires significant changes to the existing network, ie the access road to the site. Despite the U467 being unclassified, and of a basic standard, it has served the community very well over the last 50 years

Tayplan SDP and ALDP, Directing the right development to the right place' specifies that in rural areas developments should be "of a scale and nature appropriate to the intended location". The proposed buildings are unlike any nearby, both in terms of size and appearance, and will utterly dominate the area, as they will be regarded as a stand alone site

ALDP Creating high quality places specifies "Wherever development is proposed, it is important to ensure that all opportunities are taken to reuse or redevelop brownfield land before developing greenfield sites" The proposal is to commit around 90 acres of prime arable land to irreversible change. In the first year alone it is anticipated that the construction and operating of the industrial site will generate 2628 tonnes of CO2. One has to ask who is this development really benefiting? As I understand it, the farmer systematically removed a huge swathe of woodland in preparation for the tree survey. This act of vandalism destroyed many habitats for important species such as red squirrels and badgers. The people of Angus does not want to be associated with the poor welfare of birds. How this kind of practice can be defined as 'organic' is beyond comprehension and does nothing to reassure the public about the quality of food we are eating. Angus should be associated with good quality local food production along with low carbon emissions and a concerted effort to improve and not destroy biodiversity.
