Our Nursery

In Scotland all three and four year olds, and some two year olds, are eligible for up to 1,140 hours a year of funded early learning and childcare (ELC). Our ELC class offers sessions between 8:30 am and 4:00 pm, 4 days a week, over 40 weeks of the year. Other attendance patterns are available in other Angus Council settings and in our wide range of partner nurseries, playgroups and childminders. There is a playground attached to our school. VISITS OF PROSPECTIVE PARENTS

Choosing a school: a guide for parents (Scottish Government)

Parents/carers seeking a place for their child are most welcome to visit our school. Arrangements can be made by phoning the School Office.

Once your child has been allocated a place you will be invited along to meet the staff and children, to find out more about the curriculum and to share information about your child.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

To encourage a sense of belonging to our school community, we encourage all our pupils to wear school uniform, at the same time being mindful of the cost to parents.

- **Boys** are encouraged to wear grey or black trousers, white shirt or polo shirt, green pullover and school tie.
- Girls are encouraged to wear grey skirt or pinafore, white blouse or polo shirt, green cardigan or pullover and school tie.

School sweatshirts or cardigans may be worn instead of pullovers. These are green with an embroidered school badge and details of availability are obtained from the school office. You do not have to purchase items with the school badge, you can purchase bottle green jumpers and cardigans from most of the main retailers at a more reasonable cost. If you want to purchase a school tie (it's not compulsory!) they are also available from the school office.

PE Kit

Children now come to school wearing their PE kit. We do both indoor and outdoor PE. Your child's class teacher will let you know when your child will do PE.

- Indoor Kit Each child needs navy/black shorts, gym shoes and a white T-shirt.
- Outdoor PE Kit
 Warm fleece, jogging trousers (preferably black or navy) and outdoor trainers.

Please write your child's name on any item of clothing they will take off. Lost property is a huge problem in our school. We cannot return lost items to you unless they are named.

PARENTAL CONCERNS

Parents/carers should contact the school as soon as possible if they are worried about something. We want to address your concerns quickly to support both you and your child to have a positive experience with us. Please contact your child's class teacher, on Seesaw, via the school email address or via telephone, in the first instance. The staff will listen to your concern and agree a way forward with you.

PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT

BECOMING INVOLVED IN SCHOOL

The school values the important part that parents/carers play in their children's education and sees partnership with parents/carers as an effective way of enhancing children's achievements and promoting better school ethos and communication.

Opportunities for Parental/Carer/Voluntary Involvement:

- During the school day:
 - Helping with learning in the class
 - Art/Craft activities
 - Sharing knowledge and expertise in some aspect of the curriculum, e.g. topic talk, history, science, health

• Outwith the school day:

If you wish to be a regular parent helper, PVG (Protecting Vulnerable Groups) checks have to be completed. Please discuss this with staff.

Annually, all parents/carers are invited to attend a parents/carers evening in November. At this meeting parents/carers will have the opportunity to meet their child's class teacher for a 10 minute interview and hear about their child's progress. This is also an opportunity for parent/carers to hear how they can best support their child's learning. We also share information about children's progress and achievements regularly on Seesaw. Parents/ Carers receive a weekly timetable on Monday and a class weekly round up on Friday. Children regularly share their own achievements on Seesaw.



SCHOOL ETHOS

Our school ethos is built on respect and kindness (Just be nice!). We believe that positive relationships are key to building a productive school community that serves the needs of all its members. We promote 'Restorative Approaches' in the school where all views are taken into account and solutions to problems or difficulties discussed. We encourage our young people to think about others and take responsibility for their actions. We use 'Decider Skills' to help children manage their emotions and make positive changes.

We are committed to working in partnership with parents and the wider community. We have a fantastic Parent Teacher Partnership (PTP) who ensure parents' views, opinions and ideas are shared with the school. There is a real sense of community spirit and belonging.

Our school welcomes and encourages diversity and individuality, while emphasising our common commitment to moral values such as honesty, respect for others, compassion and justice. It is a fundamental principle of our school that all who are involved in the life of our school both has the right to be respected as individuals and carry the responsibility to act in a considerate and respectful manner towards others.

We implement the Council policy for Equal Opportunities and Racial equality and ensure that all pupils have access to the full range of educational experiences available within the resources of the school. We are firmly committed to the elimination of any form of discrimination on the grounds of race, religion, gender or disability.

OUR VISION, VALUES & AIMS

We reviewed our Vision, Values and Aims in session 23/24, after an extensive stakeholder and community consultation. They are based on promoting a positive mental health, inclusion and curiosity. We want our children to ask questions and lead their own learning.





SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY LINKS

A School is an integral part of the community of any town. Children develop skills and learn to be better citizens as they engage with and support the work of the local community. Our pupils participate in community events and competitions. Mr Phillips, the local Minister pops in weekly to see us.

POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR MANAGEMENT

Angus Council anti-bullying policy

Good behaviour is essential to good learning. The general aim of the school is to provide an atmosphere of mutual respect and collective responsibility, linked to our Vision, Values and Aims. Pupils, parents and staff all have an important part to play in producing and sustaining this positive ethos. We updated our Anti-bullying policy with our school community in June'24.

CELEBRATING ACHIEVEMENT

We regularly share children's achievements and successes on Seesaw, in class or at whole school assemblies.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Active Schools Co-ordinators support our Primary 7 children to run after school clubs for some of our younger children. This promotes leadership in our senior children and also offers fun sessions for the younger ones. We have a very active football team who attend local competitions – and are very successful! This year we participated in the national Glee Club competition performing in the Caird Hall. We may not have won but the children had a blast and we were very proud of them!

LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

Your child will learn in a variety of different contexts, settings and groups including ability, cooperative and social. We promote play throughout the school from Nursery to Primary 7 and observe good application of skills taught and excellent engagement in creative pursuits. Our children very much like learning outdoors. We believe that children should have the opportunity to be children! We let them play in the forest, roll down the hill, play in the mud – our children regularly go home dirty but happy!!

THE PUPILS AND PARENTS VOICE

Personalisation and choice is one of the seven principles of curriculum design and children and young people throughout their education will have the opportunity to discuss with their teacher the context in which they learn and how they will approach the learning. Staff will discuss new learning with the children at the beginning of a new topic and plan together the questions they would like to explore further. This will be shared with parents on Seesaw.

THE CURRICULUM AT SCHOOL, LOCAL AND NATIONAL LEVEL

We have recently reviewed our curriculum offer with our stakeholders and local community. We asked everyone, including the children, what they wanted to know more about, linked to current themes in society and across the world. We are developing a three-year plan based on the responses gathered. This ensures the contexts for learning



are relevant and engaging for our children. It also ensures sustainability, global citizenship and children's rights are central to our work.

LIAISON WITH SECONDARY SCHOOL

Our school is part of the Arbroath Academy Cluster. During the session regular opportunities are planned to allow P7 pupils and staff to liaise in effective and innovative ways. In June, our P7 pupils visit their chosen secondary schools for a two-day induction programme.

The school maintains close links with *Arbroath Academy* and other Primary Schools within the Angus area. Our teachers, and in some cases our pupils, visit other schools and establishments and other teachers and pupils visit us. This process is necessary for the professional development of staff, reciprocal understanding and the establishment of curricular consistency.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

MAIN ACHIEVEMENTS

This session we reviewed our vision, values and aims, almost all staff undertook a leadership role with named staff focusing on SRS, numeracy and digital technologies. These staff members created clear school improvement action plans which were tracked, evaluated, and reviewed.

Our aim in numeracy was to create a uniformed approach to maths assessment across the school, ensuring all learners build on prior knowledge and are appropriately challenged. This action plan focused on using clear assessment methodologies to identify gaps in learning and plan future learning. It also ensured that clear mathematical language is shared and used across the whole school and that maths resources were streamlined and consistent at all stages. Good practice was shared at staff meetings and high-quality moderation inputs were implemented. Staff had opportunities to share teaching pedagogy from P1-P7.

Moderation of data encouraged staff to be confident in their professional judgements, sharing a clear understanding of what a year's progress looks like. New online planning formats have been introduced and staff are becoming more confident using these. This will help to ensure high quality planning for learning, where pace and challenge are a priority and gaps are easily identified.

Learning visits indicated that improvements have been made to pedagogy and practice, with most planning being of a high quality within numeracy. Self-evaluation activities and processes acknowledge that using streamlined assessment grids do ensure progress in numeracy is tracked more robustly and that reporting is informative. Staff engaged in attainment meetings and showed increased confidence in assessing numeracy; most were able to correlate this with data and benchmarks confidently.

Within literacy the focus has been on continuing to build staff confidence to embed Sound Reading System (SRS) across all stages. This included high-quality moderation, opportunities to refresh SRS training for Support Staff, and opportunities given to teachers to team teach. Systematic use of the mastery approach from SRS has led to an improvement in reading attainment across the school.

Learning visits indicate an improvement and increased confidence in delivering SRS and staff have worked hard to maintain progress. SRS interventions and case studies show an improvement for individual, targeted learners. The work to embed SRS across the whole curriculum has been started. Most staff have observed that almost all children are applying the SRS alphabet code in other areas of the curriculum and that the weekly focus on SRS has led to improvement in reading and spelling, with children becoming more confident, spelling more independently and consistently.

A further aim in our literacy journey was to ensure that all staff have knowledge and understanding of our learners' speech, language and communication barriers so that learners are well supported to make good progress in their literacy learning. Most teaching staff have completed the high quality CLPL of Elkan training. This included ELC staff completing 3-5 years training to a level 3 accreditation and teaching staff and SPSA staff completing the 5-11 years training at either Level 2 or 3. Next year the focus will be on implementing the strategies and tools to improve both universal and individual provision.

IMPROVING STANDARDS

During the year 2022/23, most children have made progress within literacy and numeracy and those who have not, have been identified for targeted interventions. Most children in P1 have achieved expected levels in literacy with almost all achieving in numeracy. Most children in P4 and P7 have achieved expected levels in reading and numeracy with only writing being an area for improvement. This reflects the significant work planned and achieved this session, which focused on reading and the consistent improvement in pedagogy using Sound Reading System (SRS) and our focus on numeracy within our school improvement plan and improved learning and teaching, assessment and moderation. Writing will be a focus for next session.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN 2023/24

This year we are:

- Embedding our vision, values and aims across the curriculum.
- Creating innovative approaches to modernising our curriculum, networking with educational partners and community members, ensuring sustainability, learner voice and children's rights are a thread that runs through it.
- Achieving our bronze UNCR award.
- Improving our profiling for P4-7, in line with our increased understanding of children's speech, language and communication. Moderating our profiles with Speech and Language, School Nurse and Health Visitor.
- Improving parent/ carer role in targeted support/ homework
- Training 2 more support staff in Elklan
- Enlisting some parent volunteers to help with learning in class.
- Carrying out a forensic analysis of our writing data, moderating learning visits and writing jotters. We will visit other schools and use our peer visits for a writing focus.



Embed the use of talking frames and skeletons to support writing across the school.

- Increasing opportunities for staff to lead learning across the school.
- Developing our whole school play pedagogical curriculum approach by visiting Masondieu Primary's Primary 1 space, working with Sue Palmer who wrote 'Talk into Writing' and visiting Michelle Simpson in Dundee. Michelle wrote 'Play by any other name.' We will also develop staff leadership through developing the Elklan strategies at universal level and leading SRS in school and in other SRS schools.
