

VISITS OF PROSPECTIVE PARENTS

Choosing a school: a guide for parents (Scottish Government)

Parents considering sending their child to Newbigging School are welcome to visit the school, speak with the Head Teacher and have any queries answered. It is best to make an appointment before doing so, as the Head Teacher is a shared Head with another school. Contact the school by phone or email.

Once your child has been allocated a place you will be invited along to meet the staff and children, to find out more about the curriculum and to share information about your child. Parents are welcome at all times to contact the school regarding any queries they may have.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

In order to develop a feeling of belonging and pride in the school, we encourage pupils to wear the Newbigging School uniform. Uniform items are available to order at any point throughout the year from BE Schoolwear.

BOYS white shirt or polo shirt; grey jumper or school sweatshirt; grey or black

shorts/trousers; black shoes.

GIRLS white blouse or polo shirt; grey jumper/cardigan or school sweatshirt; grey or

black skirt/pinafore/trousers; black shoes.

PE KIT comfortable sports wear can be worn to school on days identified for PE.

Please note that football strips are not to be worn as PE kit.

All clothing brought to school should be named or marked in some way. It can be difficult for children to distinguish their clothing from others.

PARENTAL CONCERNS

Parents should contact the school immediately if they have a cause for concern. It is our wish to deal with all matters as early as possible, preventing them from growing into significant concerns. Please contact your child's class teacher in the first instance or if you would prefer to discuss the issue with a member of the management team please contact Mrs Smith, Head Teacher, or Miss Cameron, Acting Principal Teacher. The staff will listen to your concern and agree a way forward with you. They will follow-up the initial conversation with a telephone call approximately one week later to ensure all matters have been resolved satisfactorily.

THE COMPLAINTS PROCEDURE

Angus Council complaints procedure

At Newbigging we seek parents' and pupils' views on a regular basis throughout the session about a wide range of issues, from specific learning and teaching strategies to how well we manage behaviour and how welcoming the school is when you visit. Your views play an important part in all our planning for improvement. PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT

BECOMING INVOLVED IN SCHOOL

The school values the important part that parents play in their children's education and sees partnership with parents as an effective way of enhancing children's achievements and promoting better school ethos and communication.

Opportunities for Parental Involvement:

During the school day:

Art/Craft activities

- Sharing knowledge and expertise in some aspect of the curriculum, e.g. topic talk, history, science, health
- Practical activities in science, maths, social subjects, health education (e.g. first aid) or technology
- Reading stories to groups of children, playing reading/phonics games
- Running or assisting to run a lunch/after school club
- Supporting educational visits/trips
- Road safety Cycle Training
- Golden Time activities, e.g. board games, art and craft in small groups
- Eco Committee/gardening

Outwith the school day:

- Fundraising events
- Trips e.g. sporting events, concerts
- Extra-curricular activities e.g. coaching, sports/art clubs/country dancing/school grounds – maintenance of garden/allotment areas

If you wish to be a regular parent helper, PVG (Protecting Vulnerable Groups) checks have to be completed. Please discuss this with staff.

The school has a number of ways in which it communicates information on your child's education:

- twice yearly parents evenings at which parents are able to discuss their child's progress with the teacher – November and March - This is also an opportunity for parents to hear how they can best support their child's learning.
- annual school report issued in June
- information and photos posted via classdojo

Parents are always welcome to come in outwith these times to discuss any aspect of their child's progress. Parents are also encouraged to support as appropriate the completion of homework tasks as advised by the school.

SCHOOL ETHOS

At Newbigging Primary School we believe that positive behaviour is promoted by the solid relationships we build between pupils, parents and all the staff here at Newbigging Primary School.

Children are given clear guidelines about appropriate behaviour and expectations based on our school values. These are currently being revisited in conjunction with pupils, families, staff and the local community. We should have new vision and values for the school by August 2024.

SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY LINKS

Newbigging School is an active member of the community. The local area is used as a rich resource for learning and forming partnerships. The community is often involved in supporting the school with the many fundraising/social events organised by staff and through the Parent Council. Expertise within the local community is used to support the learning journeys of our pupils wherever possible.

POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR MANAGEMENT

We believe that positive behaviour is promoted by the solid relationships we build between pupils and staff. Children are given clear guidelines about appropriate behaviour and expectations based on our school values. Our small school ethos makes sure that children feel valued and that teachers know children well. This means that we can intervene early if any issues present themselves.

Staff use a restorative approach to supporting children if there are disagreements between them.

CELEBRATING ACHIEVEMENT

Children are encouraged to bring in, or send in via dojo, photographs, certificates and objects that reflect achievement out with school. These are displayed on the children's individual boards. These achievements are discussed and celebrated with the whole school community.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Pupils have the opportunity to participate in sporting activities with our active schools coordinator, for example golf, basketball and rugby. The children also have the opportunity to join after school clubs at Monikie Primary School such as football. Throughout the year pupils will also have the opportunity to participate in sporting festivals.

LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

Your child will learn in a variety of different contexts and groups including ability, cooperative and social. Teachers share the planning with the pupils and every opportunity is taken to provide interdisciplinary learning by finding strong links between the curricular areas for a particular area of study.

THE PUPILS AND PARENTS VOICE

Pupil and parent voice are valued by staff and there are opportunities for consultation throughout the school year.

Pupils opinions are sought with regards to the learning that happens in the school and are often involved in creating the success criteria for their learning. Pupils are also consulted about their thoughts and opinions around areas to be improved in the school, what is going well and what could be improved.

Parent voice is valued and received through consultation with parents, both at parent council meetings and other methods such as questionnaires and parents evenings.

THE CURRICULUM AT SCHOOL, LOCAL AND NATIONAL LEVEL

The class shares their learning through Class Dojo, an online tool which can be accessed by parents/carers. Teachers post WALT grids on classdojo with links to information about what topics are being covered in class each term. Teachers will also send information home giving parents access to the Class Dojo App at the start of each session. This app can also be used to communicate with school and the class teacher and for home learning activities to be posted.

EARLY LEARNING AND CHILDCARE

Newbigging Primary School does not currently have an Early Learning and Childcare facility. Children who live in Newbigging are welcome to attend the provision based at Monikie Primary School.

LIAISON WITH SECONDARY SCHOOL

The school maintains close links with Carnoustie High School and this is our cluster secondary school. There are planned transition activities for prospective S1 pupils throughout their last year in Primary School, and in June the children will spend 2/3 days at their chosen secondary school.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

IMPROVING STANDARDS

School Improvement Priority 1:

By June 2023, 100% of learners will have achieved or improved their predicted attainment level in writing and reading.

Progress and Impact

- All our learners are regularly assessed, and pupil data collected in this area by teachers to assist with identifying targeted support/ challenge in literacy and that next steps are prioritised for planned learning
- All staff have Read Write Inc (RWI) training, some staff also have RWI comprehension

- training to support 1st and 2nd level learners which has had a positive impact for all learners
- All staff have had training and the opportunity in school to moderate writing supported by the talk into writing resource, this has improved writing pedagogy across the school and the writing experience for our learners
- All learners progress is discussed by all teachers at attainment meetings, targeted interventions are planned for individuals that require support or challenge in literacy
- Our learners shared that our Wow writing wall in school celebrates success and has
 positively raised the profile of writing for all our learners
- Our learners have led the development of literacy displays and activities across the school which has impacted positively on the reading culture for all learners
- Literacy, with a focus on writing, has been a key focus on learning visits across the school
 this session which has supported professional discussion and improved pedagogy and
 resources in this area

School Improvement Priority 2:

By June 2023, 100% of learners will have achieved or improved their predicted attainment level in Health and Well-being

Progress and impact: What did the data tell you?

- Almost all of our learner's well-being has been improved with areas of support highlighted in individual well-being webs and strategies used to ensure improved outcomes for all learners
- Restorative conversations have been used successfully with all learners who require
 additional support and guidance in situations of stress or conflict, this has led to positive
 outcomes for our learners in personal well-being and relationships with peers and staff
- All staff have taken part in a rigorous PRD/appraisal process that has successfully identified gaps in professional learning, identified personal strengths and highlighted areas of improvement, improved staff pedagogy has resulted in improved teaching and learning for all
- Wellbeing web data has successfully been used to support individuals and groups of learners that would benefit for social group support for targeted intervention by teachers, support staff, EPS and ASN
- All teaching staff have taken part in professional learning using the Emotion works resource, this has improved outcomes for all learners as our learner's now know they will be listened to; their voice is important, and they see the emotional progress they are making
- The development of the UNCRC resource, picture news, has successfully created a safe and stimulating environment for all of our learners to discuss and debate their views on topical worldwide issues
- All teachers have used assessment data to support teacher judgements for all learners in the area of health and well-being, this data has been used to plan next steps for learning and to support/challenge individual learners
- Targeted support for some learners
- Has supported transitions in the school day and developed capacity for self-regulation and emotional literacy to be developed successfully

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN

Next Steps for 2023/24

- Learners to lead further developments in literacy including supporting library visits in school and planning book week
- Additional RWI and Fresh start training for any new staff and current staff
- Further literacy development focus in writing including new resources and training
- Moderation activities across the cluster created at all stages so progression is clear
- Celebration of reading, look at termly events and inclusion of parents
- Extend paired/shared reading activities across class for all learners
- UNCRC sliver award to be achieved supported by the use of picture news weekly by class teachers
- Further development of Emotion works resource to support all learners and develop their resilience and emotional literacy
- Further targeted support required for children with identified needs in nurture, social and emotional wellbeing
