PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT

BECOMING INVOLVED IN SCHOOL

We value the important part parents play in their children's education. We see partnership with parents as way to enhance children's achievements and promote better school ethos and communication.

Opportunities for Parental Involvement:

During the school day:

- Helping in the nursery class
- Art/Craft activities
- Sharing knowledge and expertise in some aspect of the curriculum, e.g. topic talk, history, science, health
- Practical activities in science, maths, social subjects, health education (e.g. first aid) or technology
- Reading stories to groups of children, playing reading/phonics games
- Supervising board games
- Teaching playground games
- Golden Time activities e.g. board games, art and craft in small groups
- Running or assisting to run a Lunch Club
- Supporting educational visits/trips
- School concerts making costumes, props, supervision of children
- Road safety Cycle Training

Outwith the school day:

- Fundraising events
- Trips e.g. sporting events, concerts
- Extra-curricular activities e.g. coaching, sports/art clubs/country dancing/school grounds maintenance of garden/allotment areas

If you wish to be a regular parent helper, PVG (Protecting Vulnerable Groups) checks have to be completed. Please discuss this with staff.

Parents are invited to attend two Parents Evenings during the school year. There you will meet your child's class teacher for a ten minute interview and hear about your child's progress. It's also an opportunity to hear how you can best support your child's learning.

We would encourage you to look at your child's learning log with them on a daily or weekly basis.

Support as appropriate the completion of homework as advised by the school.

SCHOOL ETHOS

We are committed to developing pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural values. We do this through the ethos and the curriculum. We do this in partnership with parents and take account of the needs of pupils and the views of parents.

Ethos

In St Thomas RC Primary, we create a happy, inclusive and safe environment, where children, staff and community can celebrate their faith and diversity.

SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY LINKS

Any School is an integral part of the community of Any Town. Children develop skills and learn to be better citizens as they engage with and support the work of the local community. Our pupils participate in community events and competitions organized by the churches, Inner Wheel and Rotary Club. They visit the elderly at Harvest Time and take part in sporting and cultural events.

POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR MANAGEMENT

Good behaviour is essential to good learning. The general aim of the school is to provide an atmosphere of mutual respect and collective responsibility. Pupils, parents and staff all have an important part to play in this. The rules of the school are of a common sense nature, bearing in mind the interest and safety of all concerned.

They are very much based around the Rights and Responsibilities of the UNCRC and the children are presently developing school and classroom charters.

The charters below were made by different classes. All pupils discussed and agreed how they should behave and work in class and then put together their charter. Each pupil and staff member have signed the agreement to share the responsibility of promoting a positive learning environment.

We implement the Class Dojo award points programme throughout the school and in all classes where the children are rewarded for consistent good behaviour.



CELEBRATING ACHIEVEMENT

Children work hardest when they know their work will be appreciated and praised. Staff encourage pupils at all times and in all activities to give their best. Their effort may be rewarded verbally by praise, or non-verbally by a smiley face or sticker.

Assemblies are held weekly and during them individual awards are given for successful learners, effective contributors, responsible citizens, confident individuals, group, class and individual out of school achievements are also celebrated.

Class teachers reward children for effort as well as achievement through Dojo, an

electronic programme tracking learning and behaviour, and this is communicated to parents on a daily basis.

The school has developed a 4 house system of Abbey, Bellrock, Condor and Declaration which supports healthy competition and teamwork amongst the children and adult helpers. Each house has a House Captain and a Vice-captain. The House captains represent the children in the form of a pupil voice which is working very well.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Extra curricular clubs will run throughout the year, examples of these would be;

- Scottish Country Dancing
- Basketball
- Netball
- Football
- Cricket
- Dodgeball
- Glow Football

The above opportunities will be shared with your child during an assembly. If they are interested they should ask for an application form from the school office. The form should be completed and signed by a responsible adult in the family home and returned to school.

PUPIL COUNCIL

There is an active Pupil Council at Any school. It includes representatives from all classes. The Pupil Council members are elected by their class peers at the beginning of session. They hold office for one year. Throughout the year they will meet regularly with a member of the management team. They will be involved in taking forward school improvement priorities and addressing issues as they occur.

LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

Your child will learn in a variety of different contexts and groups including ability, co-op Personalisation and choice is one of the seven principles of curriculum design and children and young people throughout their education will have the opportunity to discuss with their teacher the context in which they learn and how they will approach the learning. Staff will discuss new learning with the children at the beginning of a new topic and plan together the areas of development. This will be shared with parents through the termly overview, homework diary and Dojo and parents will be invited to support the learning by sharing resources from home or visit the school to share a talk.

Parents will be invited to share and comment regarding the planned work for their child at various points throughout the year and are encouraged to feedback their comments at any time through their child's homework diary or dojo.

THE PUPILS AND PARENTS VOICE

We encourage feedback from our pupils and parents on how we can improve outcomes for all our children, in the school and Early Learning Centre. Class teachers will regularly share learning and news from their classrooms on Class Dojo and we encourage comments or questions from home. In our Early Learning Centre, all children have an online Learning Journal which tracks their progress in learning throughout their time with us. Parents can access this from home and share learning that is taking place at home also.

THE CURRICULUM AT SCHOOL, LOCAL AND NATIONAL LEVEL

The school Twitter page, Dojo and the Parent Council Facebook page is a source of considerable information, illustrating the work of all classes across the school. We also hold regular open afternoons, which give parents/carers and friends the opportunity to join the classes and look at the work the children do in school. Parents/carers are also regularly invited to events in the school and parish, where children share their learning with everyone.

EARLY LEARNING AND CHILDCARE

In Scotland all three and four year olds, and some two year olds, are eligible for up to 1,140 hours a year of funded early learning and childcare (ELC). Our ELC class offers sessions between XX, X days a week, over XX weeks of the year. The school maintains close links with Arbroath Academy and Arbroath High School and other Primary Schools within the Angus Area. Our teachers and in some cases our pupils visit other schools and establishments and other teachers and pupils visit us. This process is necessary for the professional development of staff, reciprocal understanding and the establishment of curricular consistency.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT (School Specific)

MAIN ACHIEVEMENTS

Having recently moved in to a new school building, the staff and children have enjoyed settling in this session. We are happy to be in a shared campus and look forward to the joint working that will take place with Hayshead Primary. The schools vision statement of

'Strive to Thrive' is becoming embedded across the school and we have reviewed our values and aims. We have a close relationship with the Parish of St Thomas, and Fr Andrew is regularly in school to support the spiritual development of the children.

IMPROVING STANDARDS

We have worked hard this session to focus on the Health and Wellbeing of our children returning to school. Staff are focussed on developing resilience and supporting improved outcomes for mental health. We have a nurturing approach in St Thomas which helps the children to feel supported when facing challenges.

Raising attainment across Literacy and Numeracy continues to be a focus in St Thomas. With a high percentage of children who have English as an additional language, we have worked hard to ensure staff have a good understanding of the development of language acquisition, through training and development.

We have been developing Digital Learning within St Thomas. Each class has a set of iPads, and our P5-7 children all have Chromebooks to enhance their learning and independence in school.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN

At St Thomas we aim to work with parents, pupils and staff to ensure our improvement priorities meet the needs of our school community. We will continue to work together to raise attainment in Literacy, Numeracy and Health and Wellbeing. Ensuring all staff have relevant and up to date training to support the children.

Children in St Thomas will be developing their skills for Learning, Life and, engaging with 'My World of Work' and tracking achievements outside of school. We will be developing our Eco Schools group and taking part in Laudato Si, recently launched by Pope Francis.

Children in St Thomas' will be developing their skills in talking about their learning. They will be learning how to better assess their own learning and link to feedback given from teachers. The pupil learning council will meet regularly to talk about the learning in classes and ensure consistent learning experiences for all.

DOGS IN SCHOOL GROUNDS

We understand walking your child(ren) to and from school/nursery is an ideal opportunity to walk dogs. However, the safety and wellbeing of our pupils, families, staff and community is paramount. Also, some children feel intimidated or unsure of dogs.

So, please ensure dogs (except for assistance dogs) are not brought into school grounds.

And if you are walking your dog to and from school, please remain at a reasonable distance from the school gate.

This will enable children and adults to enter and exit safely.

We'd ask you to pass this information on to other adults who bring and/or collect your child(ren) from school.

CHILD PROTECTION COORDINATOR

If we think a child has come to harm as a consequence of possible abuse, we need to report it.

At least one member of staff in each school is responsible for child protection matters. They will have had special training in this area.
